We need and we must have a greater conception of the powers of Christianity. Not religion as taught today, but Christianity as taught by the Savior when he walked upon the face of this earth and said to men, "Come unto me, ye that are heavy laden, and when they came, said, "Go, preach my gospel to all the world." They may speak of disarmament; they may speak of war; but I tell you today, as a private citizen like you, that until we shall have accepted and practiced that peace which Christ promised to the world, there will be no peace among the nations of the earth.

WOMAN WALKED 550 MILES Wanted to See Sick Sister and Had No Other Way to Get There. How a mother and her two sons, fourteen and sixteen years old, walked nearly 600 miles in order that the mother might for the last time see her sister, fatally ill at Jacksonville, Fla., was revealed Tuesday after the funeral of Mrs. W. C. Chambers, of that city.

Mrs. Chambers became ill several months ago and physicians said it was impossible for her to recover. Her sister, Mrs. Estelle Morse, of Atalla, Ala., advised of her condition, determined to see her once more, but could not afford to make the trip by rail. Three months ago Mrs. Morse and her boys began the journey afoot and ten weeks later finished the approximately 550 miles between Atalla and Jacksonville. They were with Mrs. Chambers two weeks before the end.

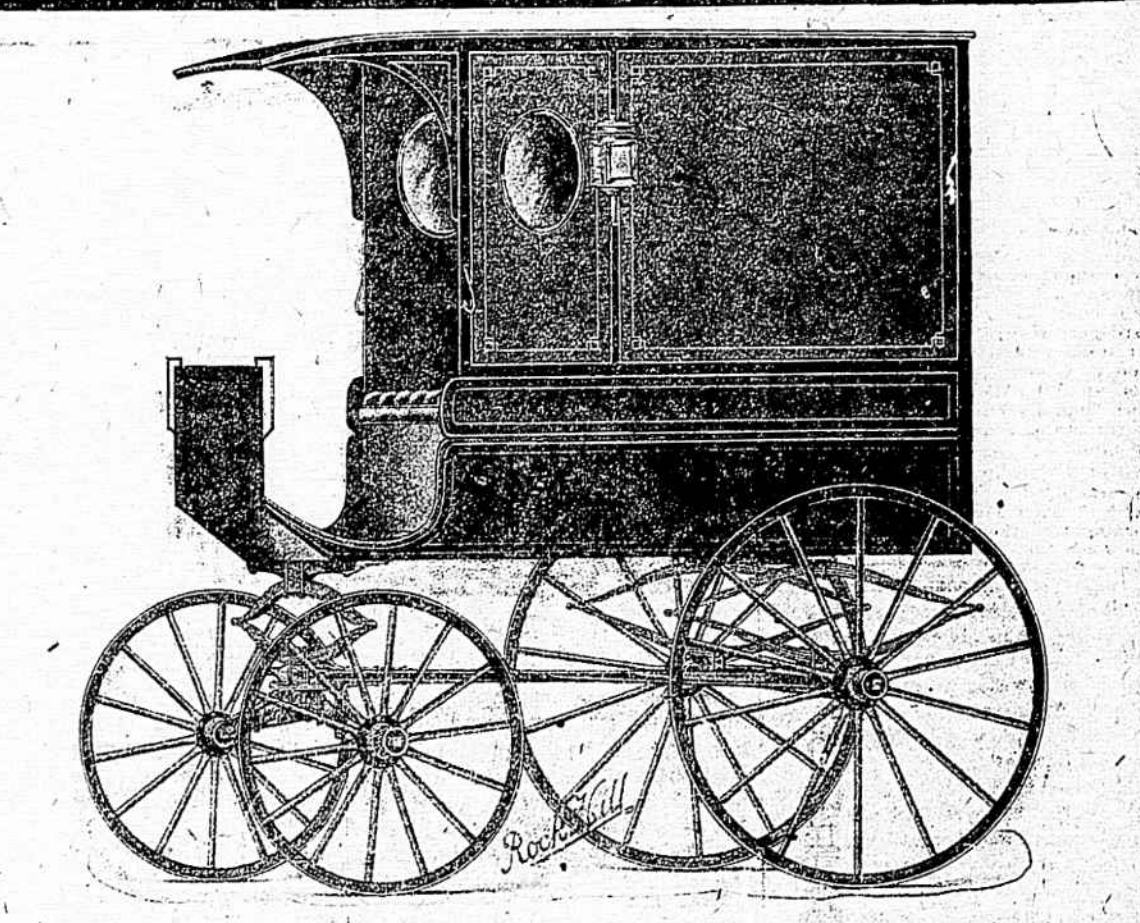
