FIGHTING BY PROXY

French Back the Turks and British Back the Greeks. War material, army shoes and equipment have been supplied gratuitously to the Greek army from England during the last few weeks, I am informed, writes a Geneva correspondent of the New York World. The source of this information is such that it is difficult to doubt its accuracy. I understand, moreover, that Sir Basil Zaharoff, the banker, could, if he chose, throw much light on the matter. Since France is now known to have undertaken to supply the Kemalists with munitions under the French-Angora Treaty, it appears that Great Britain and France are making war on each other by proxy. The Greeks are preparing for a new offensive in March and claim to have support of the British government, or at least of Lord Curzon, the British Minister. Moreov, they are indicating an attack on Bulgaria with the aid of Jugo-Slavia and Roumania. There is reason to fear that prophecies of serious trouble in the Balkans will be justified. England and France continue to arm and egg on the combatants.

Sell It To Ford.—The government ought to sell the Muscle Shoals property to Henry Ford and let him go on and develop it. What if he does make millions, what if he does sell commercial fertilizers cheaper, what if he does popularize himself with the farmers of the country, you must hand it to Henry Ford that he has a master mind and is not only capable of doing big things but has the money to hire brains to work for him. It is practically certain that the government has spent all the money that it is going to spend on Muscle Shoals because the war is over and the property development was started to supply a need cut off while the Atlantic was full of enemy submarines. Books might be written on "Conservation" in connection with the matter, but there would be nothing to them except fine spun theories. There can be no better conservation than Ford's plan to make the property useful and productive, especially under conditions that bind him to pay a reasonable price for it to begin with and turn it back to the people at the end of a hundred years. We are strongly disposed to believe as The Yorkville Enquirer "that the principal thing in the way of the turning over to Ford is the fear of the effect it will have on billions of dollars already invested in industrial enterprises of the country." Just as Ford has demonstrated that he can build a cheaper automobile, big financial interests are afraid that he might break up their playhouses in many other directions. To the south, Ford's contemplated purchase of the Seaboard Air Line railway and the Muscle Shoals property would be our greatest industrial development.—Cleveland (Shelby) Star.
