

RATES OF POSTAGE IN THE CONFEDERATE STATES OF AMERICA.

For the convenience of subscribers, and the public generally, we insert the following simplified statement of the rates of postage under the act of the Congress of the Confederate States of America, adopted on the 21st of February, 1861.

RATES OF POSTAGE Between places within the Confederate States of America.

ON LETTERS. Single letters not exceeding a half ounce in weight—For any distance under five hundred miles, five cents.

ON NEWSPAPERS. Sent to regular and bona fide subscribers from the office of publication, and not exceeding three ounces in weight.

ON PERIODICALS. Sent to regular and bona fide subscribers from the office of publication and not exceeding one and a half ounces in weight.

ON TRANSPORT PRINTED MATTER. Every other newspaper, pamphlet, periodical, and magazine, each circular not sealed, handbill and engraving not exceeding three ounces in weight.

BOOKS OF SUBSCRIPTION will be opened for \$5,000,000 at the Bank of the State in Charleston, on the 17th and 18th days of April next.

Circular to Tax Collectors.

OFFICE OF THE COMPTROLLER-GENERAL, CHARLESTON, S. C., March 25, 1861. Various interrogatories addressed to this Department in relation to Taxes levied by Act 1861, have been referred to the Attorney-General, the following communication was received in reply.

OFFICE OF THE ATTORNEY-GENERAL, March 22, 1861. To W. J. Laval, Esq., Acting Comptroller-General. Sir: Your note of the 18th, received yesterday, proposes some questions in regard to which I find it difficult to come to any satisfactory conclusion.

1. "Salaries" apply, I think, to fixed amounts received annually, or at shorter periods, for services, other than menial or merely manual.

2. The salaries of fiscal officers are not exempted from tax, nor the salaries of any other officers than those of the Army or Navy.

3. Wages of journeymen mechanics, I think, are exempt, under the exemption you refer to.

4. A Tax Collector's commissions, if not salary, would, in its widest sense, come under the head of "wages," or might be embraced under the head of "employment."

5. Notes and obligations given for PROPERTY SOLD, WHETHER MERCHANTISE OR OTHERWISE, IF ON TIME OR BEARING INTEREST, would, I think, be liable to taxation, as moneys at interest.

6. Funds not reduced to possession, and from which no present income is derived, are not within the provisions of the Act, and such is the situation generally of amounts in the hands of Masters and Commissioners.

7. Professional income I consider as the amount which the professional man receives after the expenses necessarily incident to the exercise of his profession have been deducted.
