Robert A. Harris, Circular to Tax Collectors. TAXES, TAXES, WILL

OFFICE OF THE COMPTROLLER-GENERAL, CHARLESTON, S. C., March 25, 1861. Various interrogatories addressed to this Depart-ment in relation to Taxes levied by Act 1861, having been referred to the Attorney-General, the following communication was received in reply. In construing the Act, Tax Collectors throughout the State will be governed by the opinion of the Attorney-General, as published herewith. Attention is also called to the "Additional Directions" appended hereto:

OFFICE OF THE ATTORNEY-GENERAL,) March 22, 1861.

To W. J. Laval, Esq., Acting Comptroller-General: Sin: Your note of the 18th, received yesterday, proposes some questions in regard to which I find Now is the Time it difficult to come to any satisfactory conclusion. Much, after all, in the matter of tax returns, depends on the discretion and conscience of the tax-

1. "Salaries" apply, I think, to fixed amounts received annually, or at shorter periods, for services, other than menial or merely manual. We speak of the "wages" of Coachmen and Ditchers, although engaged by the year, and paid quarterly; and of the "salaries" of a Public Officer, a Clerk or Schoolmaster. Overseers generally receive wages; but, when a man overlooks, perhaps, three or four plantations, and receives several thousand dollars, the compensation would rise to the dignity of a salary. I would take an Overseer's return either way as he chose to make it. All compensation for work not coming under the head of salary would be "wages." Salaries are taxable, how-ever small, and for the whole amount. Wages are taxable when they exceed \$500 a year, and then, in my opinion, only on the excess over that amount. Both salary and wages are compensation for the tax-payer's own services.

2. The salaries of fiscal officers are not exempted from tax, nor the salaries of any other officers than

those of the Army or Navy.

those of the Army or Navy.

3. Wages of journeymen mechanics, I think, are exempt, under the exception you refer to.

4. A Tax Collector's commissions, if not salary, would, in its widest sense, come under the head of "wages," or might be embraced under the head of "employment." The Legislature meant that all "employment." The Legislature meant that an persons, not specially excepted, should contribute something from their earnings; and public officers are specially included. Though not, in the ordinary sense, salary, I think that Tax Collectors' incomes would be most appropriately returned under 5. Notes and obligations given for PROPERTY

SOLD, WHETHER MRECHANDISE OR OTHER-WISE, If ON TIME OF BEARING INTEREST, would, I think, be liable to taxation, as moneys a interest. Notes given for merchandise usually have the interest incorporated in the amount, and this I should consider as exempting them, and not an evasion; the law is intended for cases in which the paper is in some sort an investment. 6. Funds not reduced to possession, and from which no present income is derived, are not within the provisions of the Act, and such is the situation

generally of amounts in the hands of Masters and

Commissioners. The persons to whom it shall be ultimately decided that these funds belong are not liable to a tax, and the Masters and Commissioners are certainly not liable. 7. Professional income I consider as the amount which the professional man receives after the expenses necessarily incident to the exercise of his profession have been deducted. Whether an expense may be considered as necessarily incident, must in a great degree depend on the views of the party who makes the return.
