

Mr. Editor: It is understood that our State Convention, now in session, will order an election for members of Congress to represent the State at the approaching session, to commence the first Monday in December next.

As it is all important that we should be represented by men of industry, energy and talent, permit me the use of your columns to suggest the name of one whose friends have always believed that he possessed these high qualifications in an eminent degree, and who has indeed shown that he possessed them, by his indefatigable efforts in our behalf, both in and out of Congress, for several years previous to the commencement of our late fruitless struggle for independence. I, of course, allude to Col. John D. Ashmore, our active and energetic Representative at the time of secession from the Union. It is well known to his former constituents that no man had been more conservative in his political opinions and views than Col. Ashmore, and had more serious apprehensions of the result of disunion than he did, until the die was cast, and we were all compelled to decide one way or the other—either for the South, or against the South. When the issue came, although dreading and doubting the result, he gave his whole soul to the interests of his section, and with that characteristic energy so well known as belonging to him, he advised all to give every effort to the cause of their country; and it is well known to many of his numerous friends, that if his advice and counsel had been followed in most particulars, that results would have been far different. We understand that he has sacrificed nearly his all in the cause of the Confederacy, and that, too, when he firmly believed and denounced the policy adopted by our Congress and Legislative bodies, as utterly and hopelessly destructive of our cause. He gave not only his material means to the support of the Confederacy, abstaining from corrupt money making, but also time and talents in the severest labor to organize the Postal System throughout the Confederacy, and in the Enrolling service, where he won, in both positions, the highest encomiums from his superior officers. He gave up splendid position and high hopes of future advancement, in resigning his position in the United States Congress, where he was winning laurels every day, and through his first term of service had not quite expired, he had been almost unanimously re-elected for a second term of service by a constituency whose confidence he had completely won, and to an extent that had even silenced the clamor of his personal enemies. Had he followed the example of our present worthy and distinguished President, by repatriating to Washington and taking his seat in Congress, he would have maintained and won still higher distinction before the people of the United States, as we have heard him say that the most flattering promises of promotion were held out to him by leading men in Washington, if he would abandon the South and support the Union, which he rejected without hesitation and with indignation. We are one of those who believe Col. Ashmore has high claims upon his old constituency, and he should be rewarded for his services and sacrifices in the cause of his country, by being restored to his former position as our Representative. We never voted for Col. Ashmore in his former elections, as we then knew little of him personally, but opportunities of witnessing his great energy and industry in the discharge of business duties, and his high qualifications for office, convince us that he is the man above all others to represent us in the next Congress. His experience in and knowledge of Congressional business and life, gives him great advantages, and at this time should have great weight in bringing his fellow-citizens to his support. We have understood from Col. Ashmore that he will attach himself warmly to the great National Democratic Party and support of the Union and of the policy of President Johnson and his Cabinet, in resisting the further encroachments of the Radical Republicans of the North. 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PROCLAMATION

BY THE PROVISIONAL GOVERNOR OF SOUTH CAROLINA. EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT, S. C. SEPTEMBER 18, 1865. WHEREAS it is represented that in many portions of the State there is great disturbance and apprehension from lawless persons, who are threatening, committing acts of violence remote, marauding and committing acts of violence remote from the military garrisons stationed at the Court Houses; and whereas Brigadier General Ames, Houses; and whereas Brigadier General Ames, commanding the Northwestern portion of the State, has suggested the organization of a militia police force in each District of his command, to act in concert with his forces in preserving order and peace in the community; and whereas it is supposed that the other military commanders will have no objections to the aid and assistance on the part of the citizens in suppressing crime and maintaining order; and whereas, also, it appears that President Johnson has sanctioned and authorized the Provisional Governor of Mississippi to organize a similar military force in that State, and has forbidden the military authorities there to interfere with such organization: Now, therefore, I, BENJAMIN FRANKLIN PERRY, Provisional Governor of the State of South Carolina, do proclaim, order and declare, that there shall be formed and organized in each Judicial District one or more militia companies for a home police, to act under the authority of the military garrison of such District in preventing crimes and preserving the peace of the District. The companies will consist of a Captain and three Lieutenants and eighty men, recruited from the militia force so as to be easily accessible from all points where any disturbance may occur. When the companies are formed, they will report, through their Captains, to the respective Brigadier Generals commanding in South Carolina, and to the Provost Marshals at their respective Court Houses, and from them receive their orders. When arrests have been made, they will turn the offenders over to the civil authorities or bring them before the Provost Court Marshal for trial and punishment, according to the terms of agreement between General Meade and myself as to the respective jurisdiction of the civil and military authorities in South Carolina. This police guard will be voluntary in its organization, and should be composed of none but discreet persons of standing and character in the community, who are willing to render their services promptly when the occasion requires. It is thought that the bare organization of such forces throughout the State, will have a salutary influence in preserving peace and order, and in preventing crime. The civil officers will know that there is a power ready at hand, to arrest them should they bring them to justice. It is to be hoped that all good citizens will cheerfully render this service.
