

County School Notice.

WM. H. HAYNIE, School Commissioner for Anderson County, in accordance to Section 80th of "An Act to establish and maintain a system of Free and Common Schools" for the State of South Carolina, did, on Saturday, the 26th instant, divide the county of Anderson into School Districts, as follows: The lines established, and heretofore known as Townships in this county, upon examination, were found well adapted for School Districts. Said Townships are, therefore, adopted as School Districts as laid out and defined by the County Commissioners, and the numbers assigned to the corporate limits of said Town. By adopting this course, the School Commissioner is enabled to comply with the requisitions of the law, and save the county the expense of a resurvey.

John B. Watson, Esq., and Col. Wm. S. Shaw are hereby selected as members of the Board of Examination for Anderson county.

No. 7. Hopewell District.—Wolborn Duckworth to preside, and Harrison Anderson to act as Secretary.
No. 8. Williamston District.—John L. Williams to preside, and J. J. Acker to act as Secretary.
No. 9. Savannah District.—W. A. Glenn to preside, and John M. Phillips to act as Secretary.
No. 10. Varennes District.—A. O. Norris to preside, and W. S. Hall to act as Secretary.
No. 11. Broadway District.—Thomas Erskine to preside, and S. M. Geer to act as Secretary.
No. 12. Belton District.—M. Beazelle to preside, and W. D. Wilkes to act as Secretary.
No. 13. Corner District.—J. H. Reid to preside, and Wm. Hamilton to act as Secretary.
No. 14. East District.—James S. Beatty to preside, and Wm. B. Watson to act as Secretary.
No. 15. Martin District.—Reuben Clinkscale to preside, and James A. Drake to act as Secretary.
No. 16. Honea Path District.—J. M. Greer to preside, and J. J. Shirley to act as Secretary.
No. 17. Anderson C. H. District.—J. S. Murray to preside, and W. J. Ligon to act as Secretary. The election to be held at Anderson C. H.

The elections in the other sixteen districts will be held at the places where the Selections met and held elections when the aforesaid districts were known as Townships. The polls to open at 9 o'clock a. m., and close at 4 o'clock p. m.

On motion, it was unanimously agreed by the Board of Examiners to urge upon the citizens in the various School Districts in the county the importance of turning out on the day of election and securing by election three competent and good men as Trustees for their School District. Upon a close examination of the law, it will be seen that these Trustees have powers delegated to them under the Act which, if properly discharged, will prove a blessing to the District they represent.

The election of incompetent men to said office will be a source of much confusion and annoyance to the School District. A close examination of the Act will at once convince every reader of the importance of this suggestion.
