

TNFORMATION having been received at this Ready-Made Clothing, Department, of the illegal assemblage, at various points in the Counties of Newberry and Laurens, of large bodies of armed men, whose conduct and proceedings have been characterized by lawlessness and violence, involving outrages by deadly weapons, inflicted upon peaceful and unoffending citizens; that highways and railroads have been placed under guard, and quiet and re-spectable residents warned to desert their homes under threats of violence, thus exciting their apprehensions and disturbing the public peace; And whereas, it is apparent that a large nun the Thursday on or before the full moon in each month, at | ber of these persons are regularly armed, equip ped and organized, moving under the command of military leaders, contrary to the laws of this State, which expressly prohibit, under penalty of

imprisonment in the penitentiary, all such illegal military assemblages.
Now, therefore, I, ROBERT K. SCOTT, Governor of the State aforesaid, do hereby issue this, my proclamation, commanding and enjoining upon the citizens of this commonwealth a strict observance of the public peace, the supremacy of the law and the maintenance of individual rights, discountenancing and denouncing all violence and outrage, and assisting magistrates and peace officers in arresting the perpetrators thereof; and all persons who have banded together in illegal assemblages in the Counties of Newberry and Laurens, aforesaid, are commanded peaceably to

disperse and retire to their respective homes.

The attention of all persons associated in milibeg leave to present his name as a candidate for tary organizations, or contemplating such organizations, in any portion of the State, is directed to the provisions of Section 14 of an Act to organize and govern the militia of the State of South Carolina, approved March 16, 1869, by which it is directed that there shall be no military organiza tions or formations for the purpose of arming drilling, exercising the manual of arms or milita ry manœuvres, not authorized under this Act, and by the Commander-in-Chief, and any neglect or violation of this Section shall, upon conviction, be punished with imprisonment at hard labor in the State Penitentiary for a term not less than one year, nor more than three years, at the

discretion of a competent court.

In testimony whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the Great Seal of the State to be affixed, at Columbia, this 24th day of [h.s.] September, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and seventy, and in the ninety fifth year of the Independence of the United States of America.
