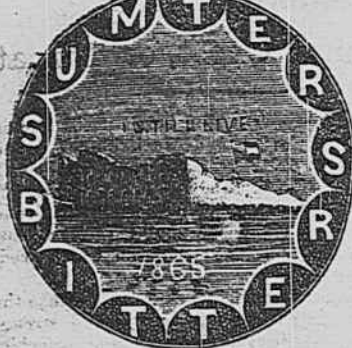


# Anderson Intelligencer.
