

Proceedings of the Town Council in Relation to the Air Line Railroad.

ANDERSON C. H., S. C., May 31, 1871. At a meeting of the Town Council of Anderson, held this day, the following Preamble and Resolutions were unanimously adopted:

WHEREAS, at a public meeting of the citizens of the town of Anderson, held in the Court House on the 27th inst., the Town Council was requested to subscribe the sum of Fifty Thousand Dollars to the capital stock of the "Atlanta and Richmond Air Line Railway Company," payable in the bonds of said town, with a deposit within its corporate limits. Therefore

1. Be it Resolved, That the Town Council will, if a majority of the legal voters of the town vote in favor of such subscription, subscribe the sum of Fifty Thousand Dollars to the capital stock of said Company on the conditions specified in this preamble.

2. Resolved, That an election be held on Tuesday, the sixth day of June next, in the Court House, from 9 o'clock a. m. until 4 o'clock p. m., and that all in favor of said subscription will vote "For Subscription," and those opposed "Against Subscription," and that all legal voters shall be entitled to cast one ballot in the election.

3. Resolved, That Wm. McGukin, Thos. M. White and W. W. Humphreys be appointed managers to conduct the election, who at its close shall count the ballots and certify the result to the Council.
