

To P. P. Zimmerman, Esq., Secretary of the Fair of the Carolinians, Charlotte, N. C.—The following is a correct statement of Cotton raised by Stevens & Cureton, on 1 1/2 acres of stubble land, which was manured with 400 pounds Carolina Fertilizer. The following is the mode of cultivation: It was thoroughly broken up 12 inches deep, and laid off in rows 31 feet wide, and the Fertilizer applied in the drill, then bedded on it on the 15th of May, and planted the same day. After working it was run around with a half shovel and partially trimmed out with a hoe. Second working it was run around with a 3 inch grub, 12 inches long, and the middle thrown 62 with a sweep 18 inches wide. One furrow to a row and thinned to a stand with a sweep 18 inches between the stocks, and afterwards it was plowed every two weeks with a sweep 18 inches wide, and hosed each time, until it was worked five times. The following is a correct statement of the Cotton picked:
First picking, 254; Second Picking, 410; Third Picking, 418; estimated amount of unpicked matured bolls, 816. Total, 1,928. Respectfully submitted,
