Friday, January 7.—Prayer: For Foreign Missions—Matthew xxvii: 19. Saturday, January 8.—Prayer for all Nations: For the maintenance of peace; for the cessation of tumults, wars, and civil strife; for the removal of intemperance, immorality, and infidelity from the land; and that the fruits of the earth may be brought forth plentifully in their season. Sunday, January 9.—Sermon: The ultimate Triumph. Psalm lxxii: 17.
