liberality and consideration for which they the State, I crave the use of your columns to offer a few suggestions to our legislators in Columbia

It is a netorious fact that the common school system as administered for the last few years under Radical rule was a misera-ble failure, benefitting nobody except the thieves who handled the swag. And it is somitted, I believe, that the system will have to be re-organized and placed upon a solid and useful basis. Now, what is the best plan to accomplish the end in view? I

soiid and useful basis. Now, what is the best plan to accomplish the end in view? It think that some plan like the following might help to secure the object sought.

First. Livide all the townships into school districts of an equal number of square miles, (say four.) and let the State build a school house and furnish it with suitable desks, the school house to be build as near the centre as possible, and heated by means of a stove placed in the centre of the building.

Second. Let there be elected by the qualified electors of each township a trustee, who shall be a bonded officer, and have charge of all school matters pertaining to the township, and who shall receive a per diem and mileage to be fixed by law. In addition to his duties as school trustee he should have charge of all matters pertaining to the roads and bridges in his township. He should make an annual report to the County Commissioners on matters connected with roads and bridges, and account to them for all moneys expended for all purposes.

Third. The township trustee shall appoint a school director for each school district, and it shall be the duty of the director to call a meeting of the voters in his school district on the first Saturday in October of each year to elect a teacher for the ensuing term; and the teacher elect shall enter into a written contract with the township trustee, from whom he draws his pay. The school director from whom he draws his pay. The school director to rail and the teacher elect shall enter into a written contract with the township trustee, from whom he draws his pay. The school director from the county; and where there are high schools let the school fund pay the tuition in the common school branches as far as it will go.

Fifth. Let all public schools commence as soon as possible after the school meeting in October, by which means a great many poor people will be enabled to send their children to school in winter and have them at home in the work season.

Sixth. Let the County Commissioners appoint a school examiner, whose duty it shall be to subject all persons applying for license to teach to a rigid written examination on the common school branches. He shall also be required to spend one day with each school in the County during the school term. Appeals shall be from the decision of the trustee to the County examiner, and may be carried from him to the State Superintendent.

I do not claim that this is a perfect plan.

I do not claim that this is a perfect plan, but I do think it would be far better than what we now have. And my idea is that this shall apply to the colored people as well as to the white. There shall be separate schools, but one set of officers for the whole. These ideas may be crude, but if you see fit you may publish them as the ideas of one who has had some years experience as a TEACHER.
