The Democratic State Convention, which met in Columbia last Thursday did its work speedily, thoroughly and most felicitously. In renominating the old State ticket and readopting the old platform, the Convention only registered the edict of the people, but it was done in such a worthy aud unanimous manner as to command the highest compliments from one end of the country to the other. Its action has hushed the rumors that there were factions in the Democratic party, and shows that the organization throughout the State is in thorough tact and harmony. The result is certain, and the State now has the assurance that we will have two years more of the wise and judicious administration with which our State has been blest under the Democratic party. -

The Radical State and Congressional Conventions met in Columbia on Wednesday, the 7th instant, and from all appearances beforehand it must have been a very poor show. The Convention will pretty certainly renominate the Democratic State ticket, although the Washington politicians have been anxious to have them nominate a full radical ticket from Governor down. The Republicans of this State realize the hopelessness of such an undertaking as running a State ticket, and very sensibly refrain from enacting such a farce. In this Congressional District, however, it is thought they will nominate E. M. Brayton, the present revenue collector, against Col.
