A bridge across Six-and-Twenty creek on the new road running from the Pendleton road four miles above this place to Passmore's bridge on the Three-and-Twenty, is very much needed. The road is traveled a great deal, and a good bridge across the stream mentioned would be a great convenience to a large section of the county. It could be built, we are told, for one hundred and fifty or two hundred dollars.

Every farmer should give due attention to his garden. Manure well, work well and it will pay far better than anything else for the same outlay. Southern people generally pay too little attention to their gardens. Entirely too much bacon is consumed by our people, particularly during the spring and summer months. It is unwholesome and instead of strengthening the system it weakens it. Vegetables, on the other hand, are wholesome, and keep the system in good tone.

The lecture of Rev. D. E. Friscon, D.D., before the Young Men's Christian Association in the Court House on last Friday evening, upon Milton's Paradise Lost, was a most beautiful composition, both in its diction and its thought, giving to many of us a much higher and grander conception of this greatest of all English poets, and affording new and pleasant thoughts to all who heard him. Dr. Friscon is always an agreeable and forcible speaker, but on Friday night he excelled himself. These lectures will prove an attractive and beneficial feature of the Young Men's Christian Association.

Messrs. B. F. Crayton & Sons have recently bought and put into operation on their farm near this place a "Chicago Seed Fertilizer, a kind of plow that is used for preparing land for cultivation and for cultivating crops after they are planted. It is also used for planting small grain, and sows the seed and plows them in at the same time. One man with four horses can do the work of twelve men and twelve horses in breaking up land, and the work of five or six men in sowing and planting crops. What a saving of labor! They have also purchased a "Camp's Manure Spreader—a cart-like vehicle—which is now on exhibition in front of their store. We hope before many years elapse a greater number of our farmers will have such im-

proved and labor saving implements in use on their farms.

Rev. Mr. Bouy, a returned colored missionary to Liberia, lectured in the colored Baptist church on Monday and Tuesday nights to large congregations, and gave a great deal of information about the country, its agricultural capabilities, etc., its native tribes, their intelligence, shrewdness and strange superstitions, and exhibited a large number of articles made and used by the heathen, including their idol god. He advised the colored people not to go to Liberia unless they had money enough to support them at least six months without having to work, and to start in business at the end of that time. He says that it takes hard work and business tact for a man to succeed there, and that common laborers are not wanted, from the fact that the natives make better laborers than the immigrants and can be had for twelve yards of cloth per month, which costs only two cents a yard.

Few cases have ever been tried in this county in which a deeper and more general interest was shown by the colored people than the one against Henry Harrison for forgery. Harrison was a school teacher, and forged the signatures of the School Commissioner and two of the township trustees to a teacher's pay certificate on two different occasions and sold them to parties in this place at a discount on their face value. The colored people generally do not believe the charge true, and look upon it more as a persecution than any thing else. They held meetings, we are told, at which special prayer was made for his acquittal, and the order of Good Samaritans, of which he was a leading light and grand officer, made a liberal contribution to his lawyers' fee. The proof of his guilt, however, was conclusive and overwhelming, and the jury were a very little while in "finding a verdict of guilty. This should be a solemn warning to others of his race occupying similar positions.

The Grand Jury made their presentation to the Court on Wednesday last week, and were discharged. They report the county officers properly kept, and say the "evils existing in some counties in this State, . . . of County Commissioners employing clerks who are attorneys and paying them besides their salaries as clerks, fees for counsel, does not exist in this county." The clerk, who is an attorney, gives counsel free of charge, and is only paid for his services as clerk. The jail is reported well kept, and some improvements about the building are recommended, both for the comfort of the jailer and the security of the prisoners. About the poor house they express themselves as being well cared for, but that there is room for some improvement in the buildings on the premises. However, we learn that the County Commissioners have the matter of erecting more substantial buildings under consideration. We find that although last year was an unfavorable year for crops that the Steward made an extra crop on the premises, amounting to about nine bales of cotton, six hundred bushels of corn and three hundred gallons of molasses. They recommend that the County Commissioners have the roads worked as soon as practicable, and that the bridge across Town Creek, near Town Creek Academy, recently washed away, be replaced immediately.

The Circuit Court.

The Court of General Sessions consumed the entire time of last week and up to Tuesday of the present week in the trial of criminal cases. The cases tried or disposed of in addition to those reported last week, and the sentences in all the convictions of the term, were as follows:

State vs. James Anderson, for rape and assault and battery with attempt to ravish. Not guilty. Accused represented by Murray & Murray.

State vs. Pink Paydon, for arson. Case continued.

State vs. Wm. Tucker, for housebreaking and larceny. Continued.

State vs. Isaac Putnam, Silas Putnam and Lily Putnam, for murder. Guilty of manslaughter, the two last named being recommended to mercy of Court. Sentences, Isaac Putnam 10 years in penitentiary, Silas and Lily each 5 years in penitentiary.

State vs. Henry R. Harrison, for forgery in two cases. Guilty. Two years in penitentiary for each offence. T. H. Cooke appeared for prisoner.

State vs. John Cleveland and Moses Cleveland, for burglary and larceny and receiving stolen goods. John Cleveland pleaded guilty, and the case against Moses not pressed. John sentenced to one year in the penitentiary. Prisoners represented by Murray & Murray.

State vs. James Lewis, for housebreaking and larceny. Guilty. One year in penitentiary. H. G. Scudder represented accused. The same party was convicted of carrying a concealed weapon, and sentenced to six months in the penitentiary for that crime. W. D. Bewley was his attorney in this case.

State vs. Martha Hill, for grand larceny. Continued.

State vs. J. A. E. Norris and Ella Miller, for adultery. Guilty.

State vs. Clifton Whitner, for selling property under a lien without notice to lender. Indictment quashed. B. F. Whitner represented accused.

State vs. R. W. Baskins. Appeal from Trial Justice Court. Appeal dismissed, and sentence of thirty days in jail passed. Prisoner represented by Scudder & Bewley.

State vs. J. R. Burton, for aggravated assault and battery and assault and battery with intent to kill. Guilty of aggravated assault and battery in two cases. The defendant having run away before the trial, sealed sentences were left with the Clerk of Court in both cases.

The parties whose convictions were announced last week were sentenced as follows:

Perry Williams, housebreaking and larceny, one year in penitentiary.

John Talley, larceny, six months in the penitentiary.

Sherman Smith, Wm. Tucker, Manual Howard, Picketney Peyton and Perry Williams, convicted of arson, life time in penitentiary.

All the parties convicted are colored, except J. R. Burton.

After sentencing the prisoners on Tuesday, the Judge called on the Grand Jury, and also sounded the Court, and also sounded the Court No. 1. As we go to press the Court is busy engaged in the trial of civil cases requiring a jury.

Judge Aldrich has transacted a very large amount of business, and at the rate heretofore made the whole of the jury cases will be disposed of by Thursday or Friday afternoon. The greater portion of the time of the Court has been consumed in the trial of criminal cases, which have been more numerous than at any previous term of Court of which we have any recollection. These cases are a great burden to the people of our county, but the summary trial and adequate punishment inflicted upon these evil doers will, we have no doubt, have a strong tendency to repress the apparent disposition towards an increase of crime. The commission of crime is now a very rare thing in this county, and a good term to the State penitentiary, where the criminal will be made not only to suffer a punishment for his crime, but by his labor to also earn some revenue for the State as a measurable compensation for such crime.

The grand jury of Sumter County in their presentment allow the stock law as follows: That, as considerable opposition to the enforcement of the stock law has been evidenced by our citi-

zens, we recommend a quiet and peaceable submission. That, while this law may bear heavily on some now, we hold the opinion that it will ultimately result in the greatest benefit to all.
