BRIEF MENTION.

To-morrow is Good Friday and Sunday is Easter. Monday was the quietest Saturday for the last six months. Anderson Grange No. 71 will meet to-morrow morning. We have heard of a few farmers who have begun planting cotton. Mrs. M. J. Hall has recently made a quilt in which there are 4,127 pieces. The town of Ninety-Six elected a dry ticket on Monday by a vote of 51 to 16. The ordinance of the Lord's Supper was administered in the Methodist and Baptist churches last Sunday morning. Maj. Thomas B. Lee has moved his family to Columbia. Many friends regretted to see him take their departure. Mrs. L. P. Smith returned home Saturday from Lake Weir, Florida, where she spent the winter with relatives. Jim Norris, colored, was convicted a few days ago before Trial Justice Wright for violation of contract and fined \$15 and costs. Mr. J. B. Alexander, of the Corner, killed his brother recently one year and a few days of, the quarters of which averaged \$7 pounds in weight. Dr. F. Diver has eight Geese thresholds on hand and persons intending to buy such machines are invited to examine his before purchasing. Appointments of the Y. M. C. They congregated in the gallery, and kept up a noise nearly the whole time Dr. Carlisle was speaking. Capt. J. A. Wren, the photographer, contemplates moving to Clinton, in Laurens county, the last of next month, with the view of making his home in that place in future. A good many of the farmers of the county are preparing to harvest their small grain by machinery this year. About twenty reapers have been sold in the past ten days by agents at this place. The Jewish Feast of the Passover, which began last Monday evening and lasts seven days, is in commemoration of the departure of the Israelites from Egypt and their passage through the Red Sea. Mr. J. Up to this time there have been 1,621 agricultural liens filed in the office of the Clerk of Court for this county, to secure advances for the production of crops this year. Some of them were filed as early as October last. Elsewhere will be found the usual notice from the County Treasurer of the collection of the May installment of State and county taxes. The levy for county and school purposes is the same as last year, the levy for the State a quarter of a mill less. Rev. Dr. Frierson and Dr. M. L. Sharp are attending the spring meeting of the South Carolina Presbytery, which convened at Ninety-Six last night. In consequence of absence of the pastor, there will be no preaching in the Presbyterian church next Sunday. A prominent Trial Justice of this county, who made his first prayer in public after making his first couple in marriage, is sending a marriage notice for publication recently, adds: "With I have quit praying much for them; pronounce the blessing and let them go on their way rejoicing." Among the passengers who went down on the train from Greenville to Charleston on Saturday was the wife and child of Lewis R. Redmond, the moonshiner. Mrs. Redmond is a witness in the United States District Court in the case against the Revenue officers for the murder of her brother, Amos Ladd. He says there are large crops of small grain sown in every section he visited, and that it is all looking very fine. The Commissioners of Richland county were presented to the Court last week by the Grand Jury for irregularities in the management of the affairs of the county. Anderson county has always had efficient Commissioners, and consequently her affairs have never been mismanaged. It is a cause for congratulation. Said a prominent citizen of Hall township to us the other day: "I am always pleased when I see new houses going up in Anderson, because it is an evidence that her citizens are prospering; and when the people of a town are prospering I know the farmers around it are doing well. I like to feel proud of my country seat." That is the right spirit. The books for the collection of the back taxes for the Savannah Valley Railroad in this city are now open in the office of the City Treasurer, and those who are ready to pay up will be waited on by that officer. A goodly number who had been waiting for the settlement of the issue between the Railroad Company and the contesting taxpayers have already settled. Mr. Joel Kelly, an inmate of the county poor house for the past eighteen or twenty years, died on the 26th ult., at the age of about 75 years. He had been paralyzed for many years, and was never known after his affliction to raise his arms above his head, until about an hour before his death. He was once well known in the county, having been a candidate for the Legislature. Mr. James Anderson an aged and respected citizen of Greenville county, died at his residence near Fork Shoals last Sunday at the advanced age of eighty-seven years. Mr. Anderson has several sons residing in this county, besides numerous friends and acquaintances who were attached to him through many years of his long and useful life. Many of our readers will learn with regret that he has passed away.

Messrs. Brown & Tribble and Orr, Wells and Allen, have published the following card: "In view of the recent action of the Board of Trade in reference to this road (the Savannah Valley) and that of the City Council in subscribing \$25,000 to the enterprise, we have concluded to withdraw our consent and to pay our taxes, and recommend only the payment of taxes, and not penalties or costs, as per agreement." Some of the owners of the bottom lands on Genesee creek are preparing to put them in cultivation this year. They are in the same condition of the Rocky river bottoms, and when drained and put in a proper state of cultivation will make thousands of acres. Let all the farmers in Anderson county, and the other counties, too, who own bottom lands now lying idle because too wet for cultivation, drain them and plant them in corn, and then the old cry of "hard times" will no longer grate upon our ears from year to year. The frogs and snakes have had possession of the finest land of the country about long enough. The meeting of Pomona Grange of this county on Saturday was well attended. The following standing committees were appointed: On Credentials—A. B. Bowden, H. J. Acker, W. T. McGill. On Subordinate Granges—J. W. Norris, P. R. Brown, L. W. Pickens. On Education—R. W. Simpson, W. W. Humphreys, J. M. Glenn, T. Labor, W. W. Russell, B. F. Crayton, T. H. Burris. The Worthy Master desires that each member of the above committee will discharge his duty, and that at the next meeting of Pomona Grange some interesting reports may be made, and that a new impetus may be given the order in this county. Mr. Wilcox R. Reeves died at his residence in the upper part of the county on Saturday, 25th March, and was buried on the day following. He was 78 years old, and had been ill for several years with heart disease. Mr. Reeves was one of the old, substantial men of the county, and had always been a useful citizen in his community. Possessing intelligence, integrity, a high sense of honor and a spotless character, he leaves behind him a record to which his posterity can ever point with pride, and an example that all men can afford to follow. He leaves several children and many other relatives, with a host of friends, to mourn his death. On last Monday night about 9 o'clock, during a thunder storm in the lower part of this county, the stables of Mr. F. M. Pease were struck by lightning and set on fire. A fine mule was killed by the shock, and when the fire was discovered it had made such headway that a good horse confined in the building could not be rescued, and consequently perished in the flames. About eight hundred bundles of fodder were also burnt. The mule and horse being the only work animals owned by Mr. Pease, he is left in an unfortunate condition. A subscription for his relief was in circulation in this city on Tuesday. The County Treasurer will be prepared in May to receive the third installment of the taxes subscribed for building the Savannah Valley Railroad, and every taxpayer in the townships that have made subscriptions should pay his taxes during that month if possible. The work on this road has been delayed long enough, and now that opposition to it has been withdrawn there should be a grand rally in its interests. Let everybody pay up their taxes and enable the Board of Directors to set on foot sufficient forces to work on it to complete it by next fall. It can be done and should be done, and if our people will but furnish the officers with the means by promptly paying their taxes, we believe it will be done.

Meeting of Directors of the Savannah Valley Railroad. At a meeting of the Board of Directors of the above Road at this place yesterday, resolutions were adopted remitting all costs and penalties on the delinquent taxes, provided they are paid during the collection of the second installment of the State taxes with the usual penalty of five per cent. This action was taken in view of the withdrawal of the opposition to the collection of said taxes. The Board also directed the Secretary to advertise for proposals for the grading of the remainder of the Road. The advertisement will appear in this paper next week. A call for the Annual Convention of the stockholders of the Road will be found elsewhere. 
