The disease of trichinosis is increasing prevalence through Pennsylvania and o and is of occasional occurrence in other States. Investigation has shown that the little insects called trichinos are contained only in the lean meat of the hog, and it is claimed by some that as much as ten per cent. of the Western hegs are diseased with it. These parasites are so small that they appear only under a powerful miscroscope, but when eaten by persons they imbed themselves The muscles, causing intense pain and

generally death. The danger of contracting this disease is only encountered when lean or half cooked pork or bacon is eaten. If the meat is thoroughly cooked the insects are effectually killed, as they cannot stand a high degree of heat; and y such cooking the meat is freed from he dangers of trichinosis. This is not a asant subject to contemplate, for bacon and pork are staple articles of food all over the country; but the frequent occurrence of this terrible disease renders it well enough to understand its causes and the means of preventing it. Cook your pork and bacon thoroughly before ing it.
