THE FARMERS' CONVENTION.

Pursuant to the resolutions of the May Convention, the annual convention of the farmers' of South Carolina was held in Agricultural Hall in Columbia on Wednesday and Thursday of last week. Twenty-six Counties were represented by about one hundred delegates, and the Convention was called to order by Capt. B. H. Tillman, who delivered a thoughtfal. and temperate address, directing the body to the salient points of the work before them. Upon the subject of agricultural education, Capt. Tillman said: First, we must perpetuate and enlarge our present organization. Work earnestly until we enlist all the best of our people in the cause and extend the organization into every County and township. The attrition of mind against mind in these local and State gatherings will itself serve a good purpose in educating farm-ers and enlarging their stock of knowledge. The exchange of experiences and the rehearsal of failures and successes at these meetings will go far to excite and professions in securing reform in our inquiry and stimulate thought. Fairs and stock shows, begetting emulation and a desire to surpass other exhibitors, will follow, and instead of the present stagnation and gloom a live current of healthy thought will soon be coursing through the minds of the people and energizing their every act.






