While in Pendleton, Gov. Richardson was the guest of Capt. D. K. Norris, and Col. Butler was the guest of Mr. O. A. Bowen. Col. Duncan arrived in the morning and went immediately out with the party. They next visited Greenville and Spartanburg, giving a day to each.

They express themselves as pleased with the various locations offered, but of course gave no intimation of preference. They will report the result of their observations to the Board of Agriculture. We trust that the Board of Agriculture will have the good judgment not to locate these stations until after the meeting of the Legislature, for the whole scheme may be changed or greatly modified next winter. The Act of Congress granting aid to agricultural stations will go into practical operation and will suggest changes in our Act which was passed before Congress had acted.
