





His physi-ciaus ascribe his death to pneumonia, but sold by Wilhite and Wilhite and winner  $- \Lambda$  Springfield man raised a pear that weighed fifty-two ounces, a trifle over this does not preclude the poison from the spider from being the original and the spider from being the original and the true cause of death. The bite was fol-lowed by blood poisoning, which in time gave way to hypostatic pneumonia, the result of the patient's enfeebled condition from the abscesses formed by blood July 9, 1891, poisoning. This form of pneumonia must not be confounded with that which arises from exposure of the air passages in the lungs to sudden and prolonged cold. Hypostatic pneumonia is frequent-ly the immediate cause of death in typhoid and other fevers. It is simply the result of weak circulation of the blood causing fluid to be deposited in the lungs which the heart has not power enough to Feb 5, 1891 reabsorb in the ordinary way. It will be remembered that this was the cause of death in General Sherman's case. Death from the bite of a spider is a rare but by no means an unknown occurrence. The large tarantulas in the southern part of this country are well known to give dan-gerous and often fatal bites.
