

- In the city of Utica, New York, may be seen the remarkable spectacle of a mountain ash tree growing on top of a stone church tower. In the course of fifteen or twenty years the tree has reached a height of about seven feet. Its roots have found their way into the cracks and arrelies of the mason work, and gained crevices of the mason work, and gained so strong a footbold that it stands there on its high pedestal through storm and sunshine, putting forth its bright green foliage every Summer, and swaying in the Winter wind as securely as if rooted in mother earth. Several times it has blossomed and borne clusters of scarlet berries. It is a well known fact that certain birds are fond of the mountain as berries, and doubtless dropped the seed in their flight which, produced this lofty tree. The wonder is that it should grow and flourish, deriving its nourishment almost entirely from the atmosphere alone. It seems to be essentially an air

plant, and always looks fresh and green,

even in the dryest season.

- Among the many vegetable wonders the pitcher plant or huntsman cup is the most interesting. The plant grows wild in peat bogs in northern Ohio, and is much valued as a vegotable curiosity.
The plant grows in clumps, leaves all radical and hollow, hence the name pitcher. The hollow leaves are most generally filled with water for the purpose of drowning insects; the inner face of the shield is beset with stiff bristles pointing downward, allowing the insects to enter, but by no means allowing them to escape. I have found as many as a dozen bibed through the inner coating of the leaf and assimilated. The proof that this plant does feed on insects is that the liquid never becomes very offensive.
