

As the managed condition of a municipal corporation is of vital importance to the citizens and taxpayers whose property is liable for the payment of all debts and demands created against the corporation, it is but a matter of simple justice that every such person should be informed of all matters in regard thereto, and should know to what extent the municipal officers, charged with the management of its affairs, have created a lien upon their property.

The present City Council, feeling sure that the citizens generally do not understand the present status of the City Treasury, directed an investigation of same and a report thereof to Council.
