Philip D. Armour, king of the pork packers, multi-millionaire, philanthropist and one of the greatest financiers of the past decade, died at his home in Chicago last Sunday, after a long illness. He started life a poor boy and died one of the world's wealthiest men. In works of charity Mr. Armour's monument will be found in short time ago he gave \$750,000 in one rememberance.

A distinguished New York penologist, Eugene Smith, estimates the direct annual cost of crime in the United States at \$200,000,000. The indirect effects of crime bring the total annual cost to about \$400,000,000. The total cost of education in the whole country in 1890 was only one-third the latter figure, amounting to \$139,000,000. In the present census returns it is not likely to exceed \$200,000,000. Crime, therefore, is twice as expensive to the country at large as the education of all classes of its population.
