Mrs. Sallivan was a daughter of the late J. G. Wannamaker, of Orangeburg, S. C., where she was born and reared, and was about 45 years of age. Since her girlhood she has been a most active and exemplary member of the Methodist Church, and was ever ready to lend a helping hand to any of its work.

She possessed many beautiful and noble traits os character of both mind and heart, and made a friend of every acquaintance. Besides a sorely bereaved husband, she leaves three sons and two daughters to cherish the memory of a model wife and a most affectionate and devoted mother, and in their grief and sorrow they have the sympathies of a host of friends and relatives. The funeral services will be held this afternoon at 3,30 o'clock at St. John's Methodist Church, and will be conducted by the pastor, Rev. J. B. Campbell, after which the body will be laid to rest in Silver Brook Cemetery.

When twenty years of age he married Miss Paralee Fuller. Though so young, she is now the widowed mother of two beautiful little daughters. They, with the bereaved parents and two younger brothers, have the deepest sympathies of many relatives and friends. The most comforting thing of all is his wonderfully triumphant victory over death. He was conscious to the last moment. Bidding his loved ones good bye that morning, he told them the Lord had pardoned all his sins and he meet him in heaven.

#### Death of Rev. Thomas Hall, D. D.

In a recent issue of the Baptist Argus, published at Louisville, Ky., Rev. Wm. Vaughn Grant, of Bloomfield, Ky., contributes the to.lowing notice of the death of the above named gentleman, who is well known here by many of our older citizens, he having been before the war a member of the faculty of the old Johnson Female University and later conducted a military school

Rev. Thomas Hall, D. D., was born in Charleston, S. C., June 29, 1828, and died July 19, 1901. Born of Episcopalian parents, he was taught the principles of that Church, but was never satisfied with them

He was converted under the preaching of the great Richard Fuller, and on November 1st, 1846, was baptized into the Wentworth St. Baptist Church, Charleston, S. C., by Rev. James Cuthbert, pastor.

In 1847 he received an appointment to West Point Academy, where he remained until 1851, graduating with honors. Was ordained in 1867 at Anderson, S. C.

He had no regular appointment until January, 1869, when he succeeded Rev. Vaughn at Bloomfield, Ky., which Church he served faithfully thatil the fourth Sunday in June, 1901, preaching two Sundays in each month.

For seventeen years of this time he also preached at Mill Creek and New Hope Churches, and for four years he served the Chaplin Fork Church. He served the Nelson Association as moderator for twenty-seven years and misssed only one meeting-on account of

illness. In 1863 he entered the Civil War as captain of a company of "boys" he mal trained himself in military tactics, having been a teacher for over twenty-

five years of his life. Early in life he married Julia E. Smith, sister to the late Dr. J. Lawrence Smith, of Louisville, Ky.,
