CLEMSON COLLEGE AFFAIR-BOARD OF TRUSTEES TO MEET JUNE 8.

The entire Sophomore Class Clemson College, numbering seventysix students, on Tuesday, April 29, rebelled against the decision of the faculty in awarding punishment to one of their class, and left the college in a body for their homes. The facts leading up to this affair do not convince one that the faculty were without blame, nor do they incline one very much to the opinion that the class should be reinstated.

No violation of a clearly defined rule should be tolerated nor go unpunished, but rules should be permanent easily to others and to ultimate ruin. and uniform, and above all promulgated, and they should prescribe a offense.

Cadet Thornwell was reported by test tubes, used for making experiments in chemistry. These tubes were not removed from the labratory were kept. Thornwell was not placed day before the faculty and questioned. He admitted he took the tubes, but lating a rule. Shortly after the meeting he was informed that he was suspended until next September. A meeting of the class followed and a trouble. paper drawn up and signed by every one of the seventy-six members to the taking acids needed, which was permitted without objection, and asking the faculty to reconsider its decision. Five declined to sign it and two were not permitted to sign it. And this brings in another fact which must be stated. A day or two after Thornwell was suspended two of the class, Bell and Cheatam, were discovered with chemical appliances in their rooms and placed under arrest, and their cases are now pending before the faculty. These cadets were not permitten to sign the agreement to leave the college, because these were eases where the appliances had been removed from the labratory to their J. R. But it is no light task to govern 500 or 600 students; correct discipline must be rigidly enforced; no other course is safe, and when misunderstandings arise between faculty and students, the faculty should be

given the benefit of the doubt by those undertaking to pass judgment.

In the light of all the facts, it is difficult to see how the rebelling class can be reinstated without changes in the faculty, and there does not appear to be sufficient grounds for this. 
