CLEMSON COLLEGE AFFAIR—BOARD OF TRUSTEES TO MEET JUNE 8.

The entire Sophomore Class at Clemson College, numbering seventy-six students, on Tuesday, April 23, rebelled against the decision of the faculty in awarding punishment to one of their class, and left the college in a body for their homes.

No violation of a clearly defined rule should be tolerated nor go unpunished, but rules should be permanent and uniform, and above all promulgated, and they should prescribe a punishment commensurate with the offense.

Cadet Thornwell was reported by Dr. Brackett, instructor in chemistry, for taking without permission four test tubes, used for making experiments in chemistry.

Since writing the above a telegram from Col. R. W. Simpson, Chairman of the Board of Trustees, has been received, announcing that the Board has been called to meet Thursday evening on the 8th inst. to consider this recent trouble.

Senator McLaurin has issued an address to the people of South Carolina in which he announces that he will not be a candidate in the next primary election to succeed himself in the United States Senate, and gives his reasons therefor.

that if there was such a rule they did not know of it and that it was not uniform, as appliances were constantly moved from the case to the desk during recitation as did Thornwell in this instance and without objection.

An investigation by the Board of Trustees would probably be a good idea. It could do no harm and would doubtless result in permanency and uniformity of rules, a promulgation of same which would furnish no opportunity for a plea of ignorance and an award of punishment commensurate with the offense.

In the light of all the facts, it is difficult to see how the rebelling class can be reinstated without changes in the faculty, and there does not appear to be sufficient grounds for this. On the other hand, it is not difficult to see that one act of insubordination, successfully carried through, lead easily to others and to ultimate ruin.

This class must have been aware of the fact that their proper course before quitting college was to appeal to the Board of Trustees. This was not done, and it would seem that in ignoring this provision, they overstepped the opportunities to redress any grievances they may have had in the decision of the faculty suspending Thornwell.
