# The Democratic Convention.

The Anderson County Democratic Convention convened in the Court House last Monday and was called to order promptly at 12 o'clock by County Chairman John E. Breazeale, who, in a few appropriate remarks, explained the object of the meeting. In closing his remarks Mr. Breazeale stated that he had served as County Chairman three successive terms, during which time he had endeavored to discharge his duties faithfully and impartially, and would therefore decline reelection, giving several valid reasons for so doing.

The first business in order was the election of a President and Secretaries of the Convention. Mr. Breazeale was nominated for President and W. H. Shearer and C. C. Langston Secretaries, and these gentlemen were elected to their positions

The roll of Clubs was then called and the names of the delegates enrolled. Of the thirty-eight Clubs in the County all but nine of them were represented.

The President announced that the election of County Chairma: to serve the ensuing two years was next in order and he was ready to hear nominations. Capt. H. H. Watkins was nominated, and there being no other nominations he was unanimously elected by acclamation. For the position of member of the State Executive Committee Hon. J. Perry Glenn was nominated and unamiously re-clected by acclamation as his own successor. Hon. J. M. Sullivan offered the following resolution, and in support of it made

a most eloquent and pointed speech: Resolved. That this convention is opposed to any change in the pledges now required of candidates and voters in the Democratic primaries, and that the delegates from this County to the State Democratic Convention to be held this month in Columbia are hereby instruct ed to oppose all such changes.

This resolution was briefly discussed by A. G. Pinckney, W. M. Gibson, R. B. A. Robinson, M. L. Bonham and Josh W. Ashley, all of Whom favored its warrin, and by Capt. B. C. Martin, B. J. German and J. G. Harris, who oppos-

id t. The question was put to the Conv... in and the fosolution adopted almost unanimously, there being less than a dozen nay votes.

The election of twelve delegates to the State Convention was next in order. The ;names of thirty gentlemen were nominated and only three of them declined. On motion, it was agreed that the twelve gentlemen receiving the high est number of votes be selected as the delegates, and that the delegation be authorized to fill any vacancy.

The delegates elected are as follows: J M. Sullivan, R. B. A. Robinson, A. G. Pinckney, J. B. Leverett, John T. Green, J. W. Ashley, J. L. Tribble, J. B. Dorthit, C. H. Bailey, S. N. Brown J. M. Payne and J. W. Quattlebaum.

On motion, the Executive Committee was instructed to communicate with the Executive Committees of the other counties in the Third Congressional District with a view of arranging for three Congressional campaign meetings in each County in the District.

Permission was asked and granted for the organization of a Club at the Belton Cotton Mills. The Democrats of Anderson were also granted permission to ville last week. organiza one or more clubs in each of the ix wards of the city.

Anderson Twine Mill.

The advancement being made in Anderson in industrial development does not depend entirely upon a combination of capital subscribed by many. the manufacture of cotton wrapping \$25,000, furnish employment for 35 opthe venture of one man, Mr. H. C. demonstration. Townsend, and illustrates the confidence felt at home in the results to be obtained from the development of Southern resources. The mill business is not new to Mr. Townsend. He has already achieved success in managing a planing mill and lumber supply business in this city.

The structure of the Twine mill will be of brick, 140x80 feet, two stories with a complement of ten or twelve cottages to house the operatives. The machinery used will be almost identical with that used by our yarn mills, a change of the guage to manufacture the coarse thread or twine being about the only difference. There will be used as machinery an opener, picker system, cards, roll drawing machines, slubbers, intermediates, speeders, twisters, reels, balling machines, & c.

Rapid headway is being made toward completing this mill. A brick machine and 26 hands are now on the ground making 25,000 brick per day. Three of the cottages have been completed and two others are in course of erection. Mr. Townsend hopes to complete the work by the middle of July next. The power to be used is electricity, furnished by the Anderson Water, Light and Power Company from Portman.
