Editor Intelligencer: Will you kindly publish the enclosed clipping which appeared in the New York World, under the above caption, on the 5th inst, and permit my own views to follow:

The Democratic Senators who walked out of the Senate Chamber in a body yesterday when Tillman, of South Carolina, began to pitchfork the English language in a characteristic whoop on the race issue, and remained out until he had finished when they walked back in a body, did their party a service. They made it clear that Tillmanism is not Democracy. Even the South Carolina Senator, thick skinned as he has shown himself to be, must have felt the point of this sharp rebuke.

This has been the opinion of quite a number of people in this State, and while his followers have been slow in finding it out, they are opening their eyes to the truism "that all the people cannot be fooled at the time."

If fooling alone the people was the only charge to be made against such a politician, the more enlightened voter would not find fault with him, but the State, the great State of South Carolina, is being rebuked when her Senator Senator is snubbed like no other man has ever been snubbed in the Senate chamber, and all on account of having a representative who misrepresents us.

To call him a Democratic would be an insult to the fathers of Democracy who struggled for life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness.

If populism is distasteful to some of his worshippers, how would the term pessimism suit? A pessimist is his own worst enemy. He refuses to walk in the light, but willingly shuts his eyes to the progress of civilization and to the beauties of the universe, closes his ears to the joyous sounds of life and to the music of nature and turns away from everything that would prove to an unbiased mind the falsity of his creed. Though fortune has showered her gifts upon him, though he may possess every advantage that wealth and education can give, though he be young, healthy and vigorous, the pessimist looks only for shadows. Is it any wonder that the Democratic party has suffered defeat twice when led by such men as Jones and Tillman.

Is it not high time to stop fighting ghosts and shadows and elect men who will be an honor and not a disgrace to the State?

The State Convention to convene soon should muzzle this autocrat or dictator, rather than force new iron clad oaths upon good men who are to be candidates for office, and who would be ruled out if the "dictator" did not approve of him or them, or, more plainly, if their passport was not properly countersigned.

If the Democratic party can realize that to win two years hence in the national election we must be organized on real issues and not on mere shadows, it will cut loose from populism, vulgarism and Tillmanism.
