A story comes of the pastor of a struggling but enterprising little church who was making a fervent appeal to his congregation for funds toward a new building, says the Philadelphia Times.

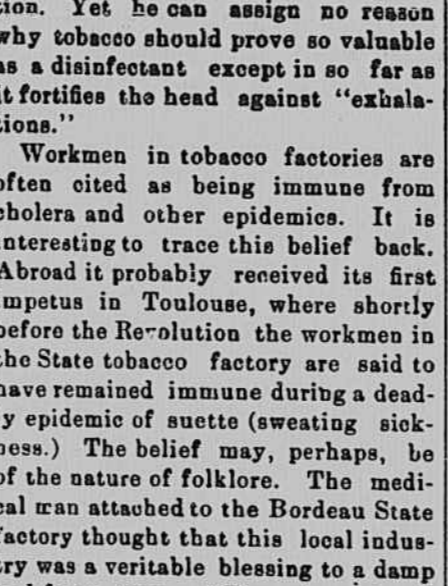
