Important Meeting of Trustees of the Graded Schools.

At a meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Graded Schools held Monday afternoon, the committee appointed from that body some time ago for the purpose of investigating and suggesting proper steps to be taken in the matter of enlarging the school facilities of the city schools, made their report and were reappointed to go before the City Council without delay and ask that they be permitted to carry this measure into execution.

The committee is composed of Hon. J. M. Sullivan, Dr. T. C. Walton and John C. Watkins, members of the Board of Trustees. The Mayor has been requested to call a meeting of the Council as soon as full attendance can be secured, for the purpose of hearing this committee, and in as much as the citizens appear to be so widely in favor of the ends sought by the Trustees, there is every reason to believe that the Council will provide the necessary means.

At this meeting the full number of trustees for the schools was completed by the election of Miss Edith Dargan, of Winnsboro, and Miss Edith Dargan, of Florence. Both are graduates, Miss Dargan from the College for Women in Baltimore, and Miss Dargan from Winthrop and both have had experience as teachers.

A list of the teachers previously elected appeared in the Intelligencer at the time.
