Negro Killed by Frain.

Thursday night last, about 10 o'clock, the dead, mangled body of one Will Gage, a negro said to have come here from Union, S. C., were discovered beneath train No. 3, which is due here from Belton at 8.55 p. m., after it had gone into the slding above the Union depot for the night.

The train arrived late. There were several empty cars standing on the siding, which were pushed back for some distance in order to make room for the train. On leaving the cab to go home the colored fireman discovered the body of a man under the tender of the engine. He called to others of the crew and, upon examination, found the man dead. No cries had been heard and the find was a shocking surprise to

Policeman Davis responded to a call, arrived promptly, examined the body and found that it was still warm. Coroner Banister was notified and empannelled a jury. After investigation the verdict was, practically, that the deceased came to his death by being ran over by the tender and cars of train No. 3 through no fault nor negliger ce of the railroad company.
