#### The Electric Current From Portman.

At noon Saturday the electrict current was turned on direct from Portman Shoals, furnishing power to the small industries and lighting the city at night. Monday the Anderson Cotton Mill No. 1 was furnished with 375 electrical barse-power and mill No. 2 ton Mill No. 1 was furnished with 375 electrical horse-power and mill No. 2 was furnished with 75 horse-power. This enabled mill No. 1 to start up all of its machinery, which obviates the necessity of night work, as has been done since December last when the electric current was cut off by the dam at Portman washing away. The engine used by this mill is not of sufficient power to run all the machinery, but being supplemented by the 375 electrical horse-power all the machinery can be run and the night work is no longer necessary.

The electrical power furnished mill No. 2 is sufficient to run the machinery of the picker room, and it is thought by the management of the Water, Light and Power Company that all the power needed at present by this mill

power needed at present by this mill can be turned on to-day.

Starting mill No. 2 this time is in most respects like starting a new mill. It may not be generally known that this mill was equipped originally for the manufacture of liner textiles than were really manufactured up to the December disaster. It is possible to manufacture coaser goods with this same machinery, and the margin of profit in coarser goods was sufficiently tempting when this mill was started up tempting when this mill was started up

to justify their manufacture.

Now, it is purposed to use the machinery for the manufacture of that particular class of goods for which it was intended—converter's cloth—which includes fine bleached sheeting and many other kinds. To get cotton started through all the different machines and harness up the looms, will take time. When it is considered that this mill has 1,060 Draper looms and forty-four thousand spindles, it can be understood that six weeks may be nocessary in which to get this mill fully under way. In the meantime the dam at Portman will be completed and all the power necessary furnished.

the power necessary furnished.

All the machinery in this mill has been thoroughly cleaned and brightened up, the interior of the mill neatly painted and everything has the appearance of being entirely new. There appears to be no difficulty in securing femids for this mill, power is the main sideratum.
It was intended to turn the electrical

current on from Portman ten days ago, but high water, the result of heavy rains just before this time, tied up the dam workat Portman and brought about the delay. From now on no delays of consequence are expected as the com-pletion of the dam is far advanced and 270 cubic yards of concrete are be-ing laid daily.

#### Anderson's New Railroad.
