Extending School District.

There is a pretty strong movement on foot to extend the limits of the school district of the city of Anderson.

The mode of procedure in extending the limits is plain and simple: The County Board of Education, when petitioned by one-third of the qualified electors in the proposed district, is authorized by statute to form the district.

There is one point in this matter, however, which is not perfectly plain: The present school district embraces the city. The City Council is empowered by charter to levy taxes within the city limits, and, pursuant to this power, levies a tax of 2 1/2 mills, which goes to maintain our city schools.

There is another way this apparent defect could be met: While agitating the question to extend the limits of the school district, some think it would be opportune to settle the question of extending the city limits to a distance of two miles instead of one, as it now is.

The members of the County Board of Education are R. E. Nicholson, T. C. Walton, of this city, and L. M. Mahaffey, of Starr.

New Ordinances.

Several new ordinances have been recently adopted by the City Council, which are highly important to the people.

The enforcement of the ordinance is in the hands of the police, which guarantees strict compliance.

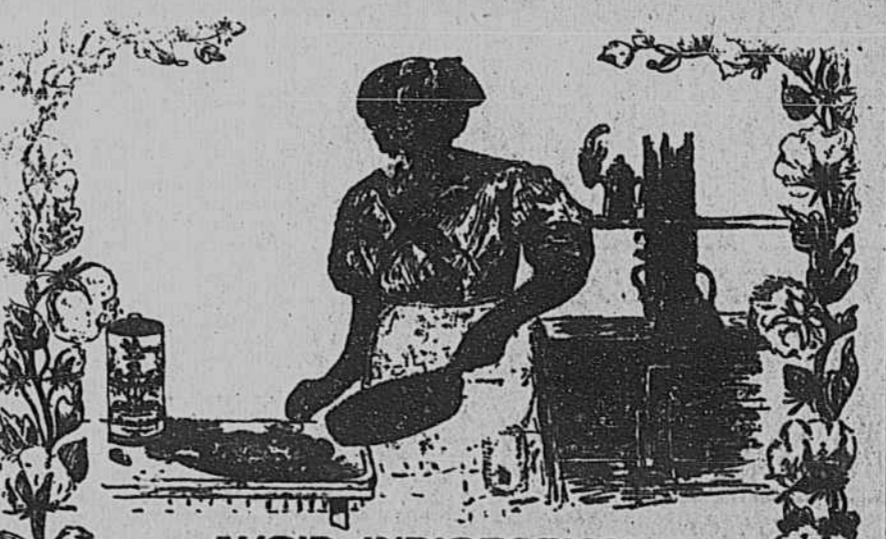
