With remarkable presence of mind he elevated the pistol and the bullet sped harmlessly through the ceiling. Rhodes advanced on him, but exposed his head and Power, quick as a flash, hit him with his club and knocked him down. He attempted to rise and Power hit him again. At this point two or more women in the house made their appearance, grabbed Power and their appearance, grabbed Power and made the air resound with screams. In the meantime Rhodes managed to get up and at once made for l'ower, using his fists vigorously on him. Extricating himself with difficulty from the women, Power rushed on Rhodes, used his "billy," got him down and put handcuffs on him and brought him to the luck-up. Monday morning he was fined \$20.
