"A preliminary survey of the proposed route from Greenville to Anderson will begin Wednesday," said Dr. Coushlin. "Jos. E. Sirrine will have charge of the work. After the preliminary survey is made and the estimate of the cost of construction made, the corporation will then be formed and a charter applied for.

"We are sure the road will be built. I cannot state the time when active work of laying the ties or rails will begin as there may be some unforseen

The Funds of the Alliance Exchange.

Considerable interest has been manifested during the last few years amongst old members of the Farmers' Alliance as to the whereabouts and final disposition of the exchange fund, which now amounts to something less than 212 0000 and management of the continuous and second se

which now amounts to something less than \$17,000 and was subscribed in \$50 shares by sub-alliances all over the State and not by individuals.

Mr. J. B. Douthit, who since last July has been treasurer of the board and who has charge of this fund, attended a meeting of the Cash Hill suballiance in Greenville County on Friday. This is the alliance that has brought suit through Mr. H. E. Brookshire to have a receiver appointed for shire to have a receiver appointed for

brought suit through Mr. H. E. Brookshire to have a receiver appointed for the State exchange.

Mr. Douthit was seen yesterday by a representative of The Intelligencer and consented to talk for publication so that the people might clearly understand the situation. He said:

"It is no use at present to go into the history of the exchange fund, but in order to make the present status clear to all interested I would like to recall a few facts. In the palmy days of the alliance it was agreed to get up an endowment for business purposes amounting to \$50,000. The interest was to be used in supporting a Farmers' State exchange. This stock, which was practically all taken, was not allowed to be taken by individuals but was taken by sub-alliances in \$50 shares. The alliances took from one to three shares and some of them paid only the first call for 25 for cent of their subscription, others paid 50 per cent and some paid the full amount. So that the total amount paid in was about \$23,000. Something over \$5,000 of this was lost during the first two or three years of operation under the management of Mr. M. L. Donaldson. Since then the fund has been kept intact except \$1,850 over draft made by D. P. Duncan in 1898-90. Last July the present board of directors were elected by the County trustee stockthe present board of directors were elected by the County trustee stockholders, who represented the subtrustee stockholders from each subtrustee stockholders from each subtrustee

trustee stockholders from each sub-alliance. This board elected Hop. A. C. Lyles, of Union, president, J. L. Keitt, of Newberry, secretary, and my-self treasurer. The preceding board had loaned the money out and when we held a meeting during fai. week in Columbia last fall, at which \$22,000 of the \$23,000 of stock was represented, more than three-fourths voted for a return of the fund to the subscribing alliances under the plan suggested by the heart of directors.

alliances under the plan suggested by the board of directors.

"As the expiration of the loan would not be until Jan. 9th, 1903, the board couldn't take immediate action, but since then have used every endeavor to locate the certificates of stock, where the whole amount was paid in and receipts for the money when partially paid. In February of this year the secretary sent notices to all the County trustee stockholders and most of them were published. We know it was published in Greenville and other counties.

was published in Greenville and other counties.

"A short time after these notices were sent out Mr. H. E. Brookshire, claiming to represent Cash Hill suballiance, in Greenville County, that had subscribed one share of stock entered suit in Columbia to have a receiver appointed to take charge of the exchange fund. One reference has been had before Judge Gary in chambers and another is to be had before it can be taken to the supreme court. This money belongs to the sub-alliances that subscribed, and where they can furnish receipts or certificates of stock the money paid in will be returned. Since this suit was started the board has used every effort possible to turned. Since this suit was started the board has used every effort possible to stop it as it always has been a principle of the falliance to settle all such differences outside of the courts. For that reason the meeting with the Cash Hill sub-alliance was called on the 8th of May and it was attended by Mr. Lyles, Mr. Keitt and myself. We found that there was a great deal of misunderstanding created before the paper was signed authorizing Mr. Brookshire to enter suit. Mr. M. L. Donaldson was personally invited to attend this meeting but failed to ap-

attend this meeting but failed to appear. At this meeting on Friday several important facts were made apparent that should be known by the pub-

ent that should be known by the public.

"In the first place Mr. Donaldson makes a claim of \$1,050 for salary due since 1892. He also employed the lawyers in Columbia who are pushing the suit to get a receiver. Mr. Donaldson has never made any kind of a demand on the board for back salary—it may be because of losing the \$5,000 of the fund during his management of the exchange. Another thing that developed was that Cash Hill alliance has a sub-trustee stockholder in the person of a Mr. Black, who has never bee a replaced by a successor. A few surviving members of this alliance signed a paper giving Mr. Brookshire a power of attorney to collect their stock in the State exchange. Their sub-trustee stockholder should have the certificate of stock and if he has he can get the money without trouble.

"The meetir at Cash Hill showed that a large majority of the neighborhood was non-committal, but it is certain that even they are much divided on the question, especially as they confessed that they didn't know.

"It seems impossible for us to stop the fight and if the receiver is finally appointed but little will be left for the alliance stockholders as it will go into court expenses and the lawyers' pockets."

Mr. Douthitt further said that another reference would be had soon and the board was prepared to take the matter up to the supreme court.
