Promotion and Development of Educational Interests.

Mr. Editor: Within the past few years there has been organized what is known as the Southern Education Board; an organization which is proving itself a very strong agency in the promotion and development of educational interests.

Death of Capt. Kay.

The Westminster correspondent of the Keowee Courier, writing under date of June 24th, says: "The death of Capt. G. W. Kay, an honored citizen of Oconee, occurred at his home on Westminster creek, two miles from Westminster, last Tuesday morning."

Just as the sun was peeping over the eastern hills. After burial services, conducted at the grave by his pastor, Rev. R. M. DuBois, assisted by Rev. H. J. Dunlie, his body was laid to rest in the town cemetery at noon on Friday with Masonic honors, members of the Walhalla and Seneca lodges joining in the ceremonies.

Capt. Kay was born in Laurens County, March 16, 1833, and had lived the allotted three score years and ten. He grew up to young manhood in Laurens and then moved to Anderson County, where he met and married Miss Mary Dickson in 1856.

Mrs. Kay died nine years ago. Mr. Kay came to Oconee the first time in 1869. After serving through the Civil War he moved to Pickens County and resided on Twelve Mile River. He removed to Oconee in 1873, where he has since resided. Three children, Mrs. Lulu Herndon, of Pelzer, W. M. and G. W. Kay, of Westminster, survive.

Captain Kay united with the Methodist Church twenty-eight years ago and took an active part in the Church work until his health failed. He was a man of great influence in this section and had many warm friends. In fact, if he had a single enemy, we never heard of it.

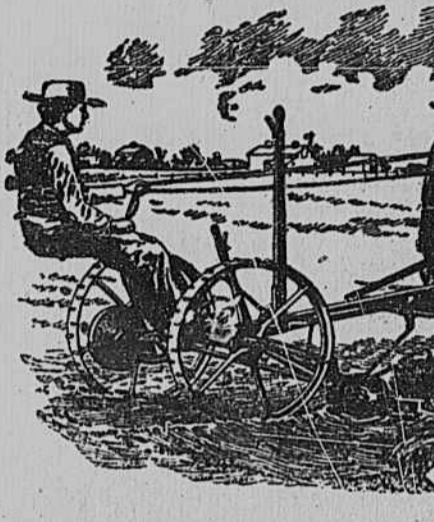
