The DEATH OF JAMES W. BROWN, Esq.—The demise of this most excellent gentleman was announced in our streets on yesterday forenoon, and threw a gloom over a very large portion of our community, who have known him long and well as one of the best of men, and as a most exemplary citizen.

CLEARANCE.—Mr. WILLIAM ROACH cleared, yesterday, for Havre, the schooner Myroser, Capt. J. H. BURGESS, with a cargo of 1219 bales upland and 40 bales of Sea Island cotton, weighing 510,268 lbs. This vessel is usually employed in the mercantile line of New York packets—first-class vessels, and well officered and manned.

THE OLD NEW YORK STEAMSHIP LINE.—At the commencement of the late war the New York Steamship Line was composed of the steamships Columbia, Nashville, Jas. Adger, Marion and John P. King. This splendid line of steamers were largely owned in Charleston.
