LOCAL MATTERS.

CONOR'S INQUEST.—An inquest was held at the City Hospital, on Sunday afternoon last, on the body of Adeline Horel, colored, who was rescued from the steamer General Hooker, at the time of the late accident, most shockingly burnt. The verdict of the jury was in accordance with the facts.

FIRE.—About 9 o'clock last night an alarm of fire was given in the First Ward. On repairing to the spot, Brown's North Wharf, we found that the schooner J. Paine, MARY master, now loading for Boston, was on fire. We understand that the captain discovered some smoke proceeding from below decks, where cotton had been stored during the afternoon, when he promptly called on the hatch and gave the alarm. The engines soon commenced playing into the schooner's hold, and at the time we left, a little after 10 P. M., it was thought that the fire would be subdued without any material injury to the vessel. We are informed that the J. Paine is partly loaded with old iron and naval stores; and that but a small cargo was cotton, not over twenty bales.

A VILLAIN ARRESTED.—The scoundrel who so injured the little girl in the burnt district, as mentioned in our paper on yesterday, has been arrested, and is now in the Guard House. Some short time ago a vessel stopped at this port, from the Dry Tortugas, with a number of Government workmen on board, and this fellow, being one of them and having left the vessel, has been roaming about the city since, and was before the Mayor some days ago for drunkenness. On Sunday night he applied for lodgings at the Guard House, being very weak and unable to go home, and he was admitted. On being directed to him, evidence sufficient to convict him were discovered, and since then the child and others have fully identified him.

FATAL ACCIDENT.—A clever little colored boy, named Edward Magwood, who had been found wandering about the streets, and had been taken to the Guard House some week or two days since, met with an accident on Sunday afternoon, which has since proved fatal. Lieut. Oopes, of the upper police, being much pleased with the little fat boy, had it so arranged as to have charge of him, and on Sunday afternoon sent him with a message from his quarters to his residence, and on his way he stopped at the South Carolina Railroad to play on the cars which were being moved to and fro. In jumping from the top of one of them to the ground, he fell across the road, when one of the cars passed over his thighs and mutilated them so that they had to be amputated, from the effects of which the poor boy died at 11 o'clock on Sunday night.

EXPLANATORY.—In our report of the fire in King-street on Thursday last, we stated that a lady was found nearly suffocated in her bed, and rescued by several firemen. We are now assured, on most reliable authority, that the lady had been suffocated previously by the smoke of fire; and that she had been rescued by the firemen; and that she was not until after the front door had been opened that she fainted, overcome by the volume of smoke which rushed in. We make this explanation at the request of the lady, who, we regret to state, has been a severe sufferer, and lost nearly her entire stock of goods. She had succeeded in dragging out as much as she could, and had given her key to the trunk which was broken open, and everything taken out of it. It contained \$15,000 in Confederate money, \$2500 in Confederate four per cent. bonds, and \$1000 in Confederate five per cent. bonds, and a very fine oil painting of Romeo and Juliet, worth \$150. The remainder of the trunk was packed with books.

THE NAME OF THE LADY IS Catharine Agnes Doyle. We hope this explanation will be satisfactory, as it was far from our intention to hurt the feelings of this lady, or to do her the least injustice.

COTTON FACTORY.—A cotton factory in Mason, Ga., is turning out 96,000 yards of sheeting per month. This is doing very well, and we are glad to record such evidences of "life in the old land;"—but we expect ere long to go considerably ahead of it. Extensive mills are now in course of construction in Kalmia, S. C., on a larger scale than any heretofore in operation in the South, where all kinds of cotton goods are to be manufactured from the cheapest homespun to the finest "prints" or calicoes.

In connection with these cotton works, there will be also a first-class paper mill, where the best article of news, book and writing paper will be manufactured. B. F. Evans, Esq., long and favorably known in this city, as engaged in the stationary and publishing business, is the President of the Company, and giving to this time, and energies to the furtherance of this project, and those acquainted with his character will require no other guarantee of the success and early completion of this laudable enterprise.

The location selected, Kalmia, in the vicinity of Aiken, S. C., is one particularly suitable for the purpose, combining as it does all the elements necessary for the successful carrying on of manufacturing on a large scale.

MAYOR'S COURT.—The man who, a day or two ago, was brought before the Mayor for being drunk, and who said that it was an accident, for he could show certificates that he had always been a member of the Temperance Society, was again before his Honor for the same offence, and having no excuse this time, was fined \$5.

A man who was fighting drunk, and had his jacket off, challenging the world to single combat, struck into nothingness before the policeman, and was brought to the Guard House like a lamb. He was fined \$5.

A nice gentleman, who got in a row some months ago, and received a slight tap on his head, upon which he still wears a patch, was again before his Honor for being drunk; but, declaring that since he got the blow on his head, he could not get drunk, he was fined \$5.

An individual who disposes of 'the ardent' was fined \$20 for not allowing his decanters to rest on Sunday, and for having human tumblers in his establishment as well as glass.

A man, not a good Christian for selling on Sunday, was fined \$5.

A horseman, who indulged in racing in the streets, to the great danger of any one who was in the way of the animals, was fined \$5 to pay for his amusement.

PROVOST COURT.—JOHN BURNS, sailor, who was carried to the Guard House being drunk and disorderly on East Bay, was fined \$2, or 2 days' imprisonment.

William Furlong, sailor, who was found lying down drunk in Anson street, was fined \$1.

Daniel Holmes, colored—Stealing.—John Dancy testified that he keeps a store in King street, and that on Saturday night last, defendant came into a store, and stole a piece of ribbon, and ran off with it. Witness pursued him, and recovered the property. Sentenced to 5 days' imprisonment.

Elizabeth Gillon, colored—Assault.—Mary Gillon (colored) testified that she is the mother of defendant, and that, on Saturday evening last, she went to wake her, to get her supper, but she wouldn't wake, and that she afterwards got up and commenced throwing the things of the house about. Witness corrected her, when defendant knocked her down; and she then called the police, and had defendant taken to the Guard House. Defendant stated, in justification, that when she thought her mother had whipped her enough, she told her to stop, and she didn't, so she knocked her down.

D. Nicholson, colored—Drunk.—Policeman Cronan testified that he was on duty in the market, on Saturday night, and saw the defendant lying on the pavement, very drunk. Witness arrested him and carried him to the Guard House; he went very quietly and made no resistance. Sentenced to a fine of \$1, or one day's imprisonment.

Amy Edwards, colored—Stealing.—Nancy Bolles (colored) testified that she lives in Tradd-street, and that on Saturday last, while she was out, defendant drew the staples from her door, and stole a quantity of her clothes, a part of which she had on Sunday. Sentenced to \$10 fine, or ten days' imprisonment.

Wm. Edwards, colored—Stealing.—Andrew O'hear, colored, testified that on Saturday evening he was standing on the corner of King and Radcliffe streets, when defendant, with two others, came up, and while the defendant engaged him in talk, and pretended that he wanted to sell him a pair of shoes, the other two stole three coats from him, and ran off with them. The defendant kept talking to prevent him from seeing what the other two were doing, but witness was so smart. One of the thieves had his shoes off. R. Houston, colored, testified that he was in a store on the opposite side of the street on some business, having just left his own store but a minute or two, when he was informed, by the clerk of the store, that three coats, valued at about eighty dollars, had been stolen, with letters and likenesses in the pockets. The boy saw the stealing and informed witness—knows nothing of it himself. The Court found defendant not guilty.

Reme Smith, colored—Stealing.—James Brown testified that on Sunday night, at 10 o'clock, he caught the defendant, James M. Dunn's wood yard on South Bay, four sticks of yellow pine wood. Sentenced to a fine of \$10 or ten days' imprisonment.

Henry Mitchell, colored—Disorderly conduct.—Policeman McDonald testified that, on Sunday afternoon, he was on duty on South Bay, where there was a crowd of colored men playing ball. Witness told them it was not proper for them to play on Sunday, and took the ball from them. They shortly after played again, having obtained another ball, and when witness made an effort to take defendant's club and ran off with it. He found defendant this morning (Monday) in the

neighborhood of the Charleston Hotel, and took him in custody; and he resisted him so that he had great difficulty in getting him to the Guard House. When witness remonstrated with him on Sunday he said he didn't care for any white-livered son of a b— Defendant care for his own hand, and witness did not strike him. The Court found the defendant not guilty. Tom Brown, colored—Disorderly conduct.—Policeman Ericson testified that as he was going on post this morning (Monday), he saw a crowd in Meeting street near the market, where the police were engaged in taking a colored man to the Guard House, and that he saw defendant on the opposite side of the street pick up a brick, and run towards the crowd, but that he arrested him before he could throw it, and carried him to the Guard House. The Court found defendant not guilty.

Edward Brown, colored—Shooting a pistol.—Policeman Houston testified that he was on duty on Saturday last at the corner of Washington and Calhoun streets, and that he saw defendant draw his pistol and fire it in the ground. The Court found the defendant guilty, but with no criminal design, and he was therefore discharged.

Thomas Givens, colored—Stealing a mule.—G. W. Shier testified that on Saturday last two boys, of whom the defendant was one, came along the Goose Creek road, about eighteen miles from Charleston, driving in a cart a black horse mule which had been stolen from his father since the 26th of February last, and when questioned about it, he said he had borrowed it from his father-in-law. Witness arrested defendant and brought him to town. R. W. Lard testified that he was coming to town on the Goose Creek road on Saturday last and saw a black horse mule in a cart, which he was sure was Shier's, and that he told the driver that he must go back to the Eighteen Mile House, to ascertain positively whether it was or not. When they arrived there, it was found that the mule was Shier's, and the defendant said he had borrowed the animal from his father-in-law, Jacob Butler. Sentenced to a fine of \$30 or 30 days' imprisonment.

Julia, colored—Disorderly conduct.—Defendant testified that on Saturday last he heard loud talking in his yard, and that when he went into his piazza defendant was using horrible language, and saying she would hit any white child she pleased. Witness told her he would have her put in the Guard House, to which she replied there was no Guard House now for her; and when she was arrested and carried to the Guard House, she told them they dare not lock her up. The defendant was discharged with a reprimand.

Thomas S. F. Myer testified that a boy, on Saturday, came into his store to buy twenty-five cents' worth of potatoes, and that he had in his hand, besides the quarter, a ten cents and two coppers; and that he took the quarter and gave him the potatoes. That defendant came in just after, and told him that the boy had a dollar, and that he had been nowhere else, and that, therefore, he (the witness) must have taken the dollar, and insulted himself and his wife very grossly. Witness told defendant she must not make so much noise in his house, and when she continued he shoved her out. She then made an awful noise, grabbed him, hit him, and almost tore his shirt off his back. Sentenced to a fine of \$1 or one day's imprisonment.
