SHOOTING.—We are informed that a man in the Charleston Jail was shot by a sentinel on yesterday, and now lies in a very precarious situation.

The globes are very handsomely finished; one engraved with a tasteful design, representing a double-breasted hand engine; the other having a steamer engraved on it. The inscription of course is not complete.

Practical men, who know whereof they affirm, have said in our hearing, that several of the late fires would have proved much less destructive had proper ladders in sufficient number been within reach. This company has made great exertions to obtain the necessary funds to enable them to procure a suitable apparatus. Part of the amount, one-half, perhaps, has been subscribed. We hope that our merchants, underwriters, property holders, and citizens generally, will come forward with their accustomed liberality and make up the remainder of the amount required. We expect that this splendid company will be organized a disinterested at the approaching anniversary of the Fire Department, in not having their complement of "trucks"; but we hope that this will not long be the case. We feel assured that this young company will make a name for itself in the annals of the Charleston Fire Department, and be second to none in energy, efficiency, self-sacrifice and usefulness.

PROVOST COURT.—Washington Griffith, colored.—Assaulting Policeman.—Policeman NATHAN testified that he was on duty Sunday morning, and at about half-past one o'clock, as he was turning from Archdale round the corner of Beaufort-street, he heard two knocks given from the corner of Elm and Beaufort streets; and when he hurried up to that point, he found sergeant Reigne and Officer C. Lowell, who informed witness that three men were fighting going on in the centre of Princess-street. Witness went round immediately, but saw no one there. After awhile three colored men came out of a house in that street, and walked up to the corner of Archdale, where one of them commenced playing a banjo. Witness said that at this time Sergeant Fuller, of the Police, came up, and ordered the man who was playing to desist, as it was no hour for playing on the banjo; he refused, saying that he was going serenading. The sergeant then ordered witness to arrest defendant, which he did, but defendant resisted, and eventually got away. Witness then went back to West street, which was a portion of his post, and there met defendant with Sergeant Fuller and a policeman in Nolan, and the sergeant again directed witness to arrest him, when defendant said he wouldn't go to the guard house, that he was not one of the party and then squared off at witness. Witness struck defendant on the ear two blows, when he broke away and ran, and there met defendant with Sergeant Fuller and a policeman in charge and carried him to the Guard House. The Court found defendant not guilty.

Samuel Henry, colored, Anson Holmes, colored, Do. Mitchell, colored, and Henry Holmes, colored.—Disorderly conduct.—John Mitchell, colored, testified that he was at the African Church in Calhoun street, on Sunday night, and that he crossed to the opposite side of the way to get a drink, when he saw and recognized Henry Holmes, George Mitchell, and Samu'l Henry, and they all immediately rushed on him. Henry Holmes said he was going to Reid street to shoot Jim Grant, and showed a pistol, which witness saw. Witness followed the crowd up to Reid street, and saw Grant, who is a friend of his, and then he saw the men who were with him, but witness told him not to go, for George Holmes had a pistol for him, but came out himself, and as he came into the street, he saw a small boy with a brick in his hand, which he made him drop; Anson Holmes came at witness and challenged him to fight, which witness refused, and being advised to leave, did so, and returned to Calhoun-street; when witness laid out in the yard, Anson Holmes caught witness by the collar, and he tried to get away, but Samuel Henry also took hold of him and held him, while Henry Holmes drew a pistol and snatched it at him several times; a large crowd of people were around, and called out repeatedly, "don't shoot him!" Samuel Mitchell struck witness a severe blow on the head and cut it, but he cannot say what he was hit with. The sentence of Henry Holmes for attempting to shoot the witness, testified that he saw two cards which were for aiding and abetting in the robbery; imprisonment; and that of George Mitchell and Anson Holmes for fighting and creating a disturbance, is ten days' imprisonment. Theodore Gough, colored.—Nuisance.—Sergeant McDonald of the police, testified that he saw two cards which were for carrying night soil with barrels, and put into an open yard in St. Phillip-street, and that the stench which arises from these have caused great complaints from the neighbors. Witness stated that on these complaints he arrested defendant. There were no horses with the carts, but the latter were as filthy as they could possibly be. Sentenced to \$5 fine or three days' imprisonment. Henry Edmondston, colored.—Disorderly conduct.—Thomas Drayton, colored, testified that he is step-father of defendant, and that he is disobedient to his mother and himself, wayward and fond of bad company, which he will not quit—that he is devoted to loafing and fighting, and will not work, although he has a good place. Witness stated that if defendant would behave himself, he could have constant employment. Witness begged that something would be done with defendant, that might tend to a reformation. Sentenced to ten days' imprisonment, unless he complies with the wishes of his parents. MAYOR'S COURT.—A man who was brought up for being exceedingly drunk, stated that he had just arrived in the city, and being bound by courtesy to drink to its property, he perhaps had drunk a glass or two too much, but that he was willing to explain to His Honor through a \$5 greenback. The apology was accepted. A gentleman of familiar manners, who having got intoxicated, and walked into the house of a citizen to sleep off on a sofa, was kindly carried from his residence to the guard house, in a sewerer's cart, for which charitable act he paid only \$10. A sailor, who was trying to force himself into a baker's oven, under the impression that it was the steamer he belonged to, was fined \$5 for loafing. A young man of inquisitive mind, who did not know exactly where he lived, was brought up for being out of his mind to knock at every door until he found his residence, was stopped by the police just as he got into the full tide of successful experiment, and a home provided him for the small sum of \$5. A bar-keeper, who was moved by the spirit, to quench the thirst of several parched throats on Sunday, paid \$5 for his kindness. A woman, who was too drunk to present herself before the Mayor on yesterday, will make her appearance this morning in full costume.
