THE RIGHT TO VOTE IN TENNESSEE. The bill regulating the right to vote, which has lately passed the Legislature of Tennessee, and is now the law of that State, embodies provisions which may be inferred from the following oath which voters are required

to take : "I do solemnly swear that I have never voluntarily borne arms against the Government of the United States for the purpose or with the intention of aiding in the late rebellion, nor have I with any such intention at any time given aid, counsel or encouragement to said rebellion, or to any act of hostility to the Government of the United States. I further swear that I have never sought or accepted any office, either civil or military, or attempted to exercise the functions of any office, either civil or military, under the authority or pretended authority of the so-called Confederate States of America, or of any insurrectionary State, hostile or opposed to the authority of the United States Government, with the intent and desire to aid said rebellion; and that I have never given a voluntary support to any such government or authority. So help me God."

Any bill containing these provisions must disfranchise at least nine-tenths of the people of Tennessee, taken as a whole, and in many portions of the State, we imagine, ninety-nine the British Admiral at that station, in giving as- in every hundred will be debarred the right to vote.

> To add to the proscriptiveness of the bill, it is previded that a commissioner of registration shall be appointed, whose concent must and vote. That commissioner is to be appointed by Brown Low, and will, of course, be some tool of his, who, if he allow any but Brown Low men to vote, will take care to preserve a safe majority of that class. In this way the curse of Brownlowism seems to be fixed upon the State indefinitely.

#### SUCCESSFUL SECESSION.

It seems that Radical logic has decided that successful secession is right. Western Virginia is a proof in point. That seceding portion of the Old Dominion is not only recognized, but is allowed to have Senators and Representatives in Congress. Now it is certain that if a State has no right to withdraw from the Union, a county has less right to withdraw from a State.

It was treason for the Southern States to secede and form a Confederacy, but it is all right for certain counties to secode and form a State. As there is a West Virginia, Tennesses is to have an East Tennesses. So you see the distinction without a difference. In the early history of North Carolina certain disaffected and ambitious parties endeavored to establish a State of Frankland out of the western portion of the Old North State, but the treasonable effort was at once defeated; and it was not till West Virginia revived the idea that anybody conceived that such a thing would be tolerated by either State-or Federal
