It was hanging on the clock, back of my store, and it was a silver-cased watch, worth about \$25. There is a door from the shop to the back room, and one from the back room to the yard. I was in the shop all the time, from when she came in until | yesterday, says: she left. There were others of my family in the house, but not in the store. She was only there long enough to go in and come right out again. The watch had a black hard string tied to it for a guard.

DANIEL HABT, sworn: Saw defendant have a single cased sliver watch by Winzer's Wagon Yard. She wanted to sell it. It had a silver case on one side and a glass on the other, and a hard skring to it. Never knew Mrs. MORGAN'S watch.

JOHN BARRY, sworn : Yesterday I found the defendant and she said she had stolen the watch, and sold it to a man for \$1.25. Told her if she confessed she should not be punished. I am a State Constable. The man she sold it to is on a boat, and has gone away. Said she stole it because she was hungry, and she thought it a trifle. Defendant guilty. Sentenced to sixty days' hard labor, subject to the order of the Post Commander. Guess she wont think it a trifle.

COURT OF GENERAL SESSIONS AND COMMON PLEAS -Court met this morning at 10 A. M. Judge DAWRING gave an earnest and eloquent charge to the Grand Jury, calling their attention particularly to the crime of burglary, which was alarmingly on the increase; also, to the houses of ill-fame with which the city is infested, and, which, as a nursery for crime, are a general nui-

The first case called was the State vs. Callan, for mur der. The prisoner was brought in and the indictment road by the Clerk. It was therein stated, that on the 27th of April, the prisoner did wound one Ed. Milligan to such an extent, that after lingering some time, he expired on the 11th of May. The State vs. Thos. Rosch, for burglary, was the next on the docket. This, it will be remembered, was the case of robbery that occurred at the Pavilion Hotels some time back. The prisoner was placed at the bar and the indictment read, charging him with having, on the night of the lth of May, burglariously entered the Pavilion Hotel, and robbing Mr. James Epps, of Clarendon District, who was stopping there, of the sum of \$2500. The prisoner plead not guilty, and a Jury was empannelled.

The first witness called was the prosecutor, Mr. James Epps. He deposed that he resided in Clarendon District; that he had come to Charleston for the purpose of at ending to some business, and had put up at the Pavilion Hotel; on the 10th he had sold some cotton to Messrs. Lee & Spener, who paid him the money, some \$7700, in large bills, 100%, 50%, and 20%; he had tied this money in a packane in the presence of Mr. Spencer, and placed it in his pants pocket, with some other articles; the money was in his pocket when he retired; he elept in the same room with his son (No. 58), and on retiring placed his clothes upon a chair; his son did not come up until two hours later; be had latched the door, but did not go to sleep until his son arrived, when the door was looked; he did not hear any noise, and was not alarmed until morning; he awoke about 4 A. M., when it was barely daylight, and immediately missed his pants; he called his son's attention to the fact, and they gave the arm.

Cross-examined—By R. W. Seymour, Esq., counsel for the prisoner.—Money was counted by banker and wrapped up by Mr. Spencer in Mr. Hank's office; the key was in the lock on the inside of the door; had never then it out; found the door locked in the morning when he got up. Witness was asked if he could recognize anywhere, A bundle was handed him, which he andld hastily, taking out the contents, he exclaimed "hore

U. S. currency, some old State money, a ring, &c.; had pocket book in vest pocket.

Cross-Examined.—His father discovered the loss in the morning, and gave the alarm; he remained in the room. They had a kerosine lamp; burnt it all night; it had burnt out when they got up. A pocket-book was handed to him which he recognized as his; it had the ring, State money, two keys, and a receipt of his in it, but the \$35 greenbacks were all gone.

Mr. Wilson, clerk of the Hotol, was then sworn. He stated that he was aroused by the watchman. He looked at his register, and found that the prisoner and a man named Hot. had roomed there that night. Suspecting them, he went to their rooms. By looking over the door, he could see into the room. He found No. 17, Hold's room, empty, had not been slept in; No. 61, Roach's room, was empty, but in a tumbled condition. The lamp was upset and some paper burnt on the floor. From remains of paper he judged it was an insurance policy. He alarmed Mr. H. L. Butterfield; informed the detectives, and put them on the track. He had suspected prisoner and the other man from the first.

Mr. McMinnis, watchman, sworn, stated that Roach and Helt came in about 12 o'clock, and paid for night's lodging and breakfast; assigned them different rooms, but they preferred to sleep together; went to No. 61. At quarter to 4 Roach came down, and was let out; he never saw Holt; don't know how he got out. He afterward went with detective O'Brien, and they arrested the prisoner in Princess street. He had on an army pistol and \$350 upon him.

O'Brien being sworn, stated substantially the same story. He was notified by Mr. Butterfield, and arrested the prisoner, Mr. McMinnis recognizing him.

Lieut, H. W. Hendricks being sworn, deposed that he was officer of the day; prisoner was brought in on Saturday morning, 12th May; was locked up; got a description of Halley, and had him arrested; nothing was found on him; received information from Holt (whose true name was Halley), where some of the things were concealed; went

Mr. Epps slopt. He also found a burglar's vice concealed in the burnt district; paid some negroes \$5 to help him find it; the vice was produced in Court; by means of it, a door could be locked and unlocked from the out-

aide.

Mr. Spencer, of the firm of Lee & Spencer, testified that he had sold the cotton for Mr. Epps, and paid him the money in large bills. He saw the package tied up and put in his pocket; it was wrapped in an insurance bodier.

This clored the testimony, and there being none for the defence, the Attorney-General addressed the jury, followed by Mr. Seymour for the defence.

A Judge Dawki s briefly summed up all the arguments, and delivered a clear and concise charge to the jury.

The jury retired, and after being absent about thirty minutes, returned a verdict of guilty of grand larceny.

SOUTH CAROLINA RAILBOAD. -The South Carolinian, of

yesterday, says:

Our citizens will be pleased to learn that freights have been reduced on the South Carolina Raliroat, and an era has been inaugurated by the company that calls to mind the palmier days before the war. We cite, as instances, leductions on the freight of the following articles: Oats to 10 cents; corn to 12 cents; salt to 70 cents; chartered cars to \$50; coal and lee to \$5 25 per ton, and 25 per cent, en stock.

Arrangements have likewise been made for the early rebuilding of the depot, and the commencement of the old system of receiving and forwarding. General Superintendent Peake has also issued orders for the reconstruction of the platform at the Charlotto Junction, so that freight may be shipped through from Charleston without the present delay and inconvenience. Freights may then be paid here instead of at Charleston. All this work will be accomplished between the first and fifteenth of July. An improvement of this description has long been desired, but the difficulties with which the railroad company have had to contend have measurably prevented the consummation so devoutly wished for.


