MURDEROUS ATTACK.—On Saturday night a negro, who said he belonged to the steamer Dictator, while going up King street, in the neighborhood of Lewis Kenake's bar-room, near the corner of Wentworth street, was knocked down by some person unknown and badly injured. He was struck on the head with a club or slung shot, and literally bathed in blood. The blow was so severe that after he rose the first time he fell twice in attempling to cross the street.

the after 8 o'clock, a corporal of the 128th U. S. C. T., with some ten other parts and with some ten other negro soldiers, was awaggering about the Market, with a pistol in his hand. No one took any notice of him until he jostled a policeman. He was then ordered off, but refused to go, saying he would not mind any d-d rebel police. The relief guard of about twenty policemen arrived about this time, going an errand, with a cloth in my hand, swinging it, magical effects and medical virtues. We speak in this and the negro soldiers left the Market and went up and it touched him in the back, and he pushed me matter "what we do know," after thirty years expe Meeting street as far as Badkneop's bar room. They stemed to be very much excited, and the corporal said in a loud voice, "Come on, let us go to the Freedmen's Bureau and get ten more of our boys-I'd like to see them take us to the Guard House." He had a pistol in his hand, which he brandished in the air. The party went a few steps beyond BADENHOP's, and then returned to that place. They then commenced firing their pistols. The police so far had not attempted to arrest them. but when the firing commenced they charged in a body and the negroes took to flight. They were pursued as far as the Military Hall, in Wentworth street, now the headquarters of the Freedmen's Bureau, where they entered and were protected from arrest. During the melec some ten or twelve pistol shots were fired, and one policeman was shot through the fleshy part of the shoulder. The straggling negroes around made considerable noise, but did not seem to take any active part in the fight.

While this was going on, six shots were fired lower down Meeting street, just by the Ice House. Sunday morning a negro was found there, shot through the thigh, with his femoral artery cut. Strange to say, he had fallen in such a position that the artery was compressed, and his life thereby saved. When turned over by the surgeon to be examined, the blood spurted out in a jet, and, but for skilful attention, he would have died in five minutes.

There were rumors of other negroes being shot, but there were no wounded reported at the Guard House, except the policeman, John Dunn, and the negro already mentioned.

The disturbance, of which the above is a meagre account, took place in Meeting-street, at the head of the Market, on Saturday night, when many women and children were present. The alarm and excitement among the bystanders was great, and the only wonder is that some innocent spectator was not killed.

THE STEAM FIRE ENGINE YOUNG AMERICA.-This new and beautiful engine, recently purchased from the manufacturer, H. C. Sileby, of the Island Works, Seneca Falls, N. Y., embracing two of the most valuable patents ever issued in this country, has in two trials, made within the last few days, perfectly satisfied not only her maker, but many of our Fire Department, that the rotary principle on which she works is superior to that of any other. The piston engine works well, and the manufacturers have in it produced great beau'y and symmetry, as well as great power; and there are in these engines essential qualities peculiar to themselves, viz: They generate steam with greater rapidity, taking but five minutes from the time the smoke issues from the are, therefore, easily managed; very steady while in

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operation, and throw a steady stream, requiring but the naual number of men at the pipe to control it; and is not as destructive to hose as the reciprocating en-

At the first or preliminary trial of this engine she threw a solid stream of 151 feet through 650 feet of hose and one-inch pozzle. Through au inch and one and one-eighth inch nozzle and 50 feet of hose she threw a stream of 202 feet, when it was discovered she was drawing air, occasioned by some slight defect in her suction joints, when the trial was discontinued to repair and made it tight. On the following afternoon a second trial was made, in the presence of a large num ber of spectators, with perfect success. The first play on this occasion she threw a solid stream through 100 feet of hose and a one and one-sixteenth inch nozzle 216 feet, with 50 lbs. of steam. The test trial then came, and at a pressure of 110 lbs., indicated by her steam guage, through 100 feet of hose and one and one-eighth inch nozzle, she threw a solid stream 242 feet clear of the pipe-which parfectly satisfied the fine company to whom she belongs, and the accomplished engineer and fireman, Mr. J. P. TELLER, who came out to thoroughly test her capacity and power.

We have now three fine steam engines in our city-the Pioneer, Etna, and Young America. Each are capable, with an ordinary pressure of steam, of throwing two powerful and steady streams 100 feet. This distance, generally, is all that is required at fires; and we learn that another will be added in a few days, by that old and favorite company, the Phœuix. With these, and the fine hand engines that compose our well organized Fire Department, and a supply of water adequate to their nececessities (which we hope soon to see introduced), we will not have to record so many disastrous fires in our city, and loss of valuable property.

A NEW STEAM FIRE ENGINE. -Since the above was written, the steamship Moneka, from New York, which arrived here last evening, brought a new and beautifu steam fire engine for the Phonix Fire Engine Company. The Phœnix Fire Company is one of our oldest and most spirited associations, composed of excellent material, and full of the spirit to do their whole duty in time of danger. We have no doubt with their new machine that they win win new and lasting honors.

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THE FOURTH OF JULY, by common consent all over the South, seems to have been turned over to the tender mercies of the colored people. Time was when the anniversary of American Independence was celebrated with great cold in every city, village and hamlet in the South; when the dawn was rung in with the joyful peals of old St. Michael's chime; when our splendid volunteer militia companies ushered in the day we celebrate by their early manœuvres on the Battery. Our population used to turn out en masse, delighted to do honor to the heroes of '76. Orations, dinners, pyrotechnic displays, all were on a grand scale, and in proportion with the good humor of the people.

Now it is otherwise. Our people showed proper respect for the day by the suspension of all business; but we believe there was no extravagant rejoicing; and very properly so. Our position is not one furnishing ground for self-gratulation or gladness.

With the negro it is otherwise. Childlike, he loves a holiday. He has a fancy for display and a great parti-ality for a "show." Our exchanges from the interior of State, and from adjoining States, as far as heard from, all give accounts of the great processions the colored people had everywhere on the Fourth. The Declaration of Independence was duly read. The orators, of course, straddled the American eagle, and sailed aloft into the soft azure of the empyrean, -clean out of sight. A notable point in all these notices was the gorgeous appearance of the "Marchals of the Day." These venerable gentlemen, adorned with light blue streamers long and gay, mounted on steeds of spirited mettle, looked as if they considered themselves "some pumpkins."

From the Atlanta Intelligencer we learn they had a row or two on that day in the Gate City. It says :

A collision occurred between some colored men and a squad of Federal soldiers, in which platol shots were exchanged by both parties, and a liberal use made of stones, brick-bats, &c. How seriously either party was damaged in this melce we are not apprised, though no lives were lost. Of its origin nothing is known, save that it is believed the negroes in returning from their festivities were interfered with by the hilarious soldiery. The difficulty at one time promised to be a serious one, but for the arrival on the spot of a sergeaut with a squad of men. Quiet was to some extent restored, when an incident of a somewhat novel character transpired. The company of regulars, apparently commanded by a mounted officer whose condition it was plain to be seen, was such as to unfit him for duty, was being marched and countermarched on Decatur street, for the purpose of quelling any further disturbance. At the junction of Whitehall, Decatur and Marietts streets the order to "file right" was given by the officer, which the men were not disposed to obey, but the company by placing himself in its front, but the man pushed on regardless of his orders. At this juncture a pistol was drawn by the officer, when the sergeant of the company clubbed his musket and knocked him from his horse, the company continuing down the street.
