PROVOST COURT, Wednesday, July 18 .- There was another case before the Court to-day in which a policeman was censured for going beyond the bounds of his duty. As these cases are of great interest to the community at the present time, we publish the evidence and the judgment of the Court in full, being satisfied that the public will be able to draw their own inferences without any hints from us. The few blanks used in the testimony represent language unfit for the public United States vs. Daniel Blackwood (colored)

Threatening and abusive language to the police.

—Policeman James Nolan, sworn: I belong to the police force; I was on duty on King-street, near Broad-street, between four and five o'clock yes-Policeman sames xoran, swift. I belong to the police force; I was on duty on King-street, near Broad-street, between four and five o'clock yesterday afternoon, when defendant was saying that he would shoot any — white — — —; I had no star on, but told him he had better move on, when he asked what I had to do with him; there were two persons standing near, to whom he appeared to address himself; he said to me, "you white — — —, what have you to do with me." As he refused to move on I told him I was a policeman, and took him to the Guard House; I found \$2.50 on him; he made no resistance after I showed him my star; he said that I was just the kind of man he would like to get at; his conversation was that he would kill any — white — — that came in his way; a white man and woman stood near him.

\*\*Cross-examined.\*\*—He was making a noise, and was a public nuisance; I have a right to arrest any one making a noise; he pulled back when I arrested him: I did not strike him or he me.

\*\*Wm. Jackson (colored), sworn: I know defendant; he stays at my house; I was present when he was arrested; we were walking quietly along, speaking about two soldiers walking along with two policemen, when one of the policemen threw his hand back and struck defendant in the mouth; he struck him three times and called him a — black — — —; then he showed a star, and arrested him and took him off; he struck defendant before he arrested dim, and before he showed his star; I asked what right he had to arrest a man when he was not on duty; then he showed his star and arrested defendant, and struck me and called me a nigger.

\*\*After hearing the above evidence, Major Corbin,

and called me a nigger.

After hearing the above evidence, Major Corbin, the Provest Judge, delivered the following

There does not appear to have been any great occasion for an arrest in this case. An arrest should not be made too hastiy. Arrest is a serious matter, and should not be made without a prima facie cause. Any offence being committed, a private citizen can interfere, but he does it at his peril; but if he is in the right, the Court will sustain him. Phis Court is auxious to sustain all lawful authority, and especially the police force of this city. But it cannot refrain from expressing an opinion in this case, as in the one tried yesterday, that the policeman was over-zealous in his duty, and the attent in of the Captain of Police will be called to this case, that the police may know that they must not make arrests for trivial matters, as the unwise and oppressive use of authority is calculated to irritate the people, and give only more trouble to-themselves and the city.

The prisoner was then reprimanded for using improper language in the treet, and discharged.

James Clements (colored) was fined \$2 for sleeping in the street, but on his statement that he was in town for the first time, and was unacquainted with the regulations, and on his promise to seek work immediately, his fine was remitted. He was warned, h. wever, that if he was ever brought up again for the same offence, he would be severely.

A white man was brought up for spitting on the dress of a colored woman, but no witness appearing against him, he was discharged.

A very ignorant darkey brought a charge against a much smarter fellow of his own color for stealing his clothes and money. He stated clearly enough what he had lost, and how he had lost it, but his idea of the time was extremely muddled. He said that it was last summer about a month ago. The truth of the story seemed to be that the prisoner had borrowed the clothes and money of the witness without leave, but that afterwards the witness had consented to the loan. The clothes had been returned much the worse for wear, but the money had not been returned at all. The blank look of disappointment and wonder on the prosecutor's face when he was told that his action should be on the civil and not the criminal side, was ludicrous in the extreme.
