The Charleston Cotton Market. There was an active demand for the staple yesterday, with sales of near 2000 bales, at very full and, in some cases, advancing prices; but the latter was not sufficient to quote the market higher. We, therefore, renew our quotations of yesterday:

Savannah Market. SAVANNAH, August 15.—COTTON.—During the past week the cotton market has been dull, prices ranging principally from 27 to 32 1/2. New York Middling has been quoted recently at 32c, and to-day the same quality has been offered at 31 1/2 to 32c.

It is now a matter of certainty that there will be very little cotton in the South of the old stock on the 1st day of September next. If the estimate of a crop as given above shall prove to be correct, estimating the currency on the basis of its present value as compared with gold and sterling exchange, it appears highly probable that the average price of middling cotton during the next twelve months will not be below 25 to 30c. per lb.

As soon as the stocks of cotton, however, begin to accumulate at the ports, consumers and speculators will take advantage of the numerous producers, who will probably succeed in obtaining a higher price for their cotton.

The demand for havana, corn and provisions, generally, will be larger than for any year previous to the late war. Reference is made to the demand for supplies to be drawn from New York, Philadelphia, Baltimore, and other Northern cities. Prices or provisions will therefore continue high, as is also for havana and rice.

NEW ORLEANS, August 11.—The market opened this morning with only a moderate inquiry, and notwithstanding factors showed increased willingness to realize and a disposition to make further concessions, still the sales were confined to about 900 bales, including a list of 150 purchased late in the evening.
