Georgia Items.

FIRE IN CUMBERB.—The kitchen of the Rev. J. F. Dagr was consumed last Friday night. The citizens generously made up a purse to compensate him for his losses.

BURGLARS IN CUMBERB.—Robberies have become quite frequent throughout the State. The store of J. Cobb Davis was entered about two weeks ago, while he was at supper, and a trunk containing \$1500, taken.

On Saturday night last the residence of Jno. F. Kiddoo was entered and a trunk removed into the hall and examined. The sleeping apartment of the family was next approached, when the inmates were aroused and the thief took to his heels.

The next night, Sunday, the residence of Dr. McLeister was rifled of a portion of its contents; and, among other things, the Dr.'s pants were worn off in triumph, and the pocket of his brother-in-law's relieved of three or four dollars.

The thief generously left a pocket case of instruments in the yard; and also a worthless pocket-knife.—Macon Journal.

DEATH OF L. D. MINTER.—We were pained to learn, yesterday, that Mr. L. D. Minter, of Harris county, was lying at the point of death, and would not probably live an hour. His disease, we suppose, was congestive chill.

Mr. Minter was formerly the foreman of this office, and was well known to most of our citizens. He was a man of sterling uprightness and integrity, and was a useful member of the community in which he lived.

DARING OUTRAGE BY A NEGRO.—On Thursday evening last, a negro calling himself Peter Evans, secreted himself under the bed of Mrs. Dyer, residing in Robertville, and for his timely discovery, would have, no doubt, accomplished his hellish designs.

MURDER IN OGLETHORPE.—We learn, from what may be considered a reliable source, that Dr. Watkins, living at Sandy Cross, in Oglethorpe, was murdered by a negro woman, a few days ago.

THE ELECTION YESTERDAY.—The election for Mayor yesterday, to fill the vacancy occasioned by the resignation of Hon. Jas. T. Gardiner, passed off quietly. There had been several candidates announced, but all of them withdrew, except Mr. Foster, who was elected.

There were no less than eleven candidates for the Corporation of Savannah. Dr. R. P. Myers was the successful candidate. The Journal and Messenger, of the 18th, says the construction train on the Fort Gaines Branch of the Southwestern Road, ran over Charles Rogers, a deaf and dumb man, in a few hundred yards of the depot at Cuthbert, on last Saturday morning.

CONVENTION OF DRAYMEN.—There was a council of draymen on the City Hall lot, a few days ago. The scene is said to have been a rich one. Speeches were made by several African Demosthenes. They wanted harmony of action, and the whole subject of drayage was sagely discussed.

MAIL POUCH BROKEN OPEN.—On yesterday morning, about nine o'clock, the through mail pouch from Columbus to Savannah was returned, broken open, to the postoffice. It had been found in the ditch between the junction of the Muscogee Railroad with the Mobile and Girard Railroad, by a negro in the employ of the Muscogee Railroad, and by him handed over to the conductor of that corporation.

HORRIBLE SUICIDE.—IMPOSSIBILITY TO IDENTIFY THE VICTIM.—Our coroner yesterday morning held an inquest on the body of a man, found dead in a room of a house on a street of a suburb of this city. The unfortunate victim had, a few days ago, hired a suit of rooms, and not having been seen since he entered them, the intelligent freed woman who plays landlady over the premises, when, the other being forced open, a horrible spectacle was discovered.

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A disgruntled "reb," in the Valley, has had a commission sent him as Captain of a militia company recently formed in his county. He returned it with the following endorsement: "Respectfully returned, disapproved. D—n Governor Pierpont and his Virginia militia!"
