CHARLESTON BOARD OF TRADE.—The Regular Menthly Meeting of the Charleston Board of rade was held at 8 P. M. yesterday, at the Cho Room of the Charleston Hotel.

In Me absence of the President, E. WILLIS, Esq. Vice-President, took the chair.

The Minates of the previous meeting were read and approved.

The only unfinished business before the meeting was a resolution proposing amendments to the Constitution and Ry-Laws, proposed on a previous meeting by Mr. C. H. Moise. Reports of Committees being called for, Mr. E. PLATT reported as follows:
