South can neither be entered by purchasers for money or located with Land Warrants. He says that the only way in which lands can be acquired in those States, now, is by homestead, for actual settlement and cultivation, as provided by the Act of Congress, approved 31st June, 1866, and each claimant is thereby restricted to one half quarter section, or 80 acres; the disposal of mineral lands, however, including iron and coal, remaining unaffected by the operation of said act.

IMMIGRATION AND EMIGRATION. Shall the people of the South emigrate from the land of their fathers and leave it to fall into the hands of strangers, or shall they invite immigrants from all parts of the world to settle in their midst and join them in enabling the country to recover from the baleful effects of civil war? In favor of the former policy are all those who are so wedded to the things that have passed away that they can see no hope for us in the future. Disheartened by the results of the war, they would leave the home of their nativity and try their fortune in unknown lands. These people are blinded by passion and prejudice, and become the easy victims of emigration societies and their agents. The home which was once luxurious, but is so no longer—but which requires only industry to make it comfortable, and enterprise to make it luxurious again—is abandoned for life in the wilderness, where it will take the hard work of two generations to accumulate the comforts which have been wantonly sacrificed. The object of this movement—the advantage proposed to be gained by the exchange—is said to be freedom from Northern control. Nowhere on the American continent can the emigrant from the South be sure of that freedom, and in the Old World there is certainly no room for him. We are, therefore, constrained to believe that all schemes for the emigration of the Southern people are wrong, and only beneficial to the emigrant societies and their agents.

The number of people that will emigrate from South Carolina will be small—not only because there are not a great many who want to go, but because even of those who do want to go, the greater part are compelled, by want of means, to stay. Strange to say, however, of the large majority who will remain in the State, a great many are opposed to immigration—that is to say, they object to a large influx of foreign population into the State. They take the ground that it will deprive the native population of the control of the country, and that the foreigners, combining with the negroes, will throw the State into the control of the Radicals. Now, these objections are weak in the extreme. Experience shows that foreign settlers fall into the opinions of the people among whom they live, and become strongly attached even to their prejudices. In the late war, Irish, Germans and French fought on the side of the South with as much ardor as their countrymen fought for the North, and hated our enemies with all the passionate earnestness of natives. The truth is, then, that a large immigration is the true way of regaining our political equality; and when we consider, in addition, the vast material wealth which their industry would create, and the great amount of land now lying waste which it would put under cultivation, we cannot but conclude that the best thing that could happen for our State and her people would be the rapid increase of her foreign population.

THE CHARLESTON AND SAVANNAH RAILROAD.

By an advertisement in the city papers, the public have been informed that the Charleston and Savannah Railroad will be offered at public sale on the 20th of November next. The City of Charleston depending, as she does almost entirely, on the railroads which connect her with the interior for the limited prosperity she at present enjoys, it is of the utmost importance to her interests that they should be owned and managed by those who, while they may be zealous to declare good dividends, will also take care to pursue such a policy as will advance the trade of this city. In the hands of enterprising men, the Savannah Railroad can be made of an importance second to no avenue of communication at present leading into the interior from this point. It should, at the earliest moment, be connected with the Georgia Central Road at or near Millen, when we will be placed, by the shortest route, in connection with Macon, at which city the railroads from Southwestern Georgia terminate. The valuable line to Columbus and Montgomery, which is to be extended via Opelika to Tusculum, on the Tennessee River, forming by this route the shortest and best through connection with the West; the Macon and Western Railroad and its connections, leading to Atlanta, Chattanooga, and places beyond—all come into Macon, which has become a grand railroad centre. These roads and their connections pass through a country much of which is of considerable fertility, and is noted as a fine cotton region. It is a section that has dealt heavily with this place, and there is room for a largely extended

trade. By another branch, if found necessary, this road might be carried to Augusta, Georgia, along the route of the Port Royal Railroad, and which has had a large amount of work done on it. This line to Augusta would be about as short as the South Carolina Road, and would pass through a fertile portion of Beaufort and Barnwell Districts, which has heretofore traded with Savannah. There are also other proposed connections of much importance, but those that have been mentioned, show with much force the urgent necessity of having this road fall into proper hands.
