THE ATIANTIC AND PACIFIC RAILROAD.—The Board of Commissioners named under "an act granting lands to aid in the construction of a railroad and telegraph line from the States of Missouri and Arkaneas to the Pacific ocean," passed at the first session of the Thirty-ninth Congress, met at St. Louis, Mo., October 1. The following officers were elected: President, General John C. Fremont, of New York; Vice-President, Daniel R. Garrison, of Missouri; Secretary, Charles H. Howland, of Missouri; Treasurer, J. P. Robinson, of New York.

General Fremont, in taking the chair, delivered an address, enlarging upon the advantages of the proposed route. By a recent act of Congress, he said, the line of the road is laid in Southwestern Missouri and the valley of the Canadisa, and generally along the thirty-fifth parallel to the head of navigation on the Colorado, and thence to the Pacific coast. To aid in its construction, the act grants over twenty-five thousand acres of land to the mile, making for the entire route about forty-six millions of seres. Its really central position the mile, making for the entire route about forey-six millions of acres. Its really central position makes the line national. We believe that it will prove to be the shortest, and it certainly presents fewer natural obstacles, and is the most practica-ble of any among all the proposed routes to the Pacific. From Springfield to San Francisco its es-Pacific. From Springfield to San Francisco its estimated length is one thousand eight hundred miles, making for the distance from St. Louis about two thousand miles, and from New York about three thousand two hundred miles to San Francisco. From New York, by way of Memphis, to San Francisco, the distance is three thousand seven hundred, making a difference of five hundred miles in favor of this route.

THE RUSSO-AMERICAN ALLIANCE.—The St. Petersburg Zeitung, of September 14, says that all pre-parations on the mainland and the soundings in Behring's Straits for the completion of the line of telegraph between Russia and America are nearly finished.

follograph between Russia and America are hearly finished.

In the course of the present year the telegraph will be constructed over a distance of 3500 miles beyond Revel, and the lines will be finished from Granley Haven to the Kwiehpak and along the valley of this river, from the mouth of the Anadyr to Fort Anadyr, from Okhotsk to Gtschiga, and perhaps even as far as to be joined with the Anadyr line. The calle between Granley Haven and Seedjamin Bay, a distance of about seven hundred miles, and that between Cape Sponberg and Cape Tolstoi, in the Bay of Anadyr, will, as it is said, be laid before the end of this month. American and Russian energy has been very quick in taking steps to complete the tie which is to connect and hold together the two nations whose new alliance, though baptized in champagne and heralded forth by a bequet of fireworks, cannot be regarded without a slight feeling of uneasiness by some of the more westerly nations of burops.

Hon. Mr. Mangin, chief editor of the Phare de la Loire, published at Nantes, which initiated the project of presenting a gold medal to Mrs. Lin-coln in commemoration of President Lincoln, in a coln in commemoration of President Lincoln, in a recent letter to a friend of the Lincoln family, states that in consequence of the great number of subscriptions, it became necessary to substitute for the originally intended medal a larger one, adequate in value to the increased amount of the subscriptions. He adds that the "commemoration medal for the noble widow of the glorious and unfortunate Lincoln" has been already struck, and that the imperial mint at Paris declining to do the work, it was done by the Geneva mint. Mr. Mangin insists that the "French Democracy shall deliver, by the hands of its representative, the symbolic offering personally to Mrs. Lincoln."

W. H. Beard, who returned not long since, from an expedition to Denver, has nearly completed a picture embodying a sentiment suggested by Iudian life—the central object being an ancient tree which has at last succumbed to the pressure of time and tempest, and the wreck of which attracts the notice of a grizzled old Indian for whom it had long been a landmark in the forest.

Steel Rails.—The London and Northwestern Railway Company in England have already laid sixty-three miles of steel rails on their road, and the work of relaying with steel, instead of iron, is to be continued. On the Great Northern Railway of England steel rails have also been laid at all the principal stations, and on the steepest inclines.
