Factors in the early part of the day were generally disposed to sell at the ruling rates, but after the receipt of the 11 A. M. private dispatches reporting an advance in gold and an improvement at Liverpool, they materially stiffened their pretensions, causing several buyers to withdraw from the market. Under these circumstances the sales were restricted, amounting to only 2500 bales, taken by eleven brokers, at prices within the range of last evening's quotations, which were as follows: Ordinary 25a28c, Good Ordinary 25a30c, Low Middling 31a32c, and Middling nominal at 34c. There was somewhat of discrepancy between parties as to the position of prices at the close, the majority holding that although there was no improvement, yet that a better feeling pervaded the market. The sales for the past three days comprise 11,200 bales, naishing an aggregate for the week of 15,000 bales, against 9200 last week. The market is in a state of chaos. There is an oversupply of goods, and prices are lower and very irregular; for the glut is too great, and holders have no inducement to keep their goods if buyers could only be found. Several failures are announced. Brown sheeting and shirtings are dull at a decline, and bleached goods sell very slowly at a considerable cor-cession, the stock meanwhile ascumulating. Heavy drills are in some small request. Canton flannels are dull. Stripes are inactive, and ticks are steady. Denims are not in demand.

In prints there has been a large addition to the supply, while the price has declined 1a2c, which has not induced any improvement in the demand. Ginghams are in fair request and steady. Delaines are weak in price. The demand is hardly equal to the supply, and only very choice styles realize quotations. Coburg are moderately active. Shawls of desirable style are in active demand. Inferior goods are much lower. Broadcloths are inactive. Cassimeres are without improvement. A few desirable fancy styles sell at good prices, but all others are neglected. Satinets are dull. Linseys inactive. Blankets are more active.

BOSTON, November 24.—The dry goods market exhibits no improvement, in view of the general decline in values; and the prevailing duliness seems to be intensified in all its departments. The volume of trade, both from first, and second hands, is considerably below that of the corresponding time last year, though prices rule much lower than they did then.

There is a very week and unsettled feeling both in cotton and woolen goods, occasioned partly by the decline in gold and raw material, and partly by the unseasonable mild weather, which enables buyers to hold off and prevents seasonable products from going into consumption. Distributors all over the country are anxious to see cold weather; and if the market is kept free from disturbing causes, they anticipate an unusually brisk trade during the winter.

But aside from climatic influences, we have no doubt that as soon as gold quotations exhibit more steadiness, good prices will also settle, and we shall witness a revival of business.

Nearly all styles of cotton goods have fallen off 1a1-5c

STATE OF TRADE.—According to the Manchester Guardian, the hope of any early improvement in the prices of manufactured goods scens almost to have vanished, and consequently the imporative necessity of an immediate resort to short time has forced itself more decidedly than hitherto on the minds of nearly all those who have the produce of the mills to dispose of. A meeting of the cotton manufacturers of Darwen was held yesterday, "and, with very few exceptions, every firm in the town was represented and unanimously agreed at once to commence working four days a week only."

According to a circular of Messrs. Arles, Dufour & Co., of Lyons, the great activity which has prevailed in the silk trade since the opening of the season began to slacken towards the end of last month, and the subsequent transactions have been rather limited. This dullness, however, creates no disappointment, since, after the important purchases made for four months past, a certain period of quietude was to be looked for, the more so as, at the present high rates, manufacturers find no inducement for making provisional purchases to any extent. In silk goods some transactions continue, principally for account of the American market, and further orders are anticipated from that quarter. Meanwhile, prices of the raw matrial are still firmly maintained, particularly for

Meanwhile, prices of the raw matrial are still firmly maintained, particularly for all superior descriptions, both European and Asiatic. The stock in those sorts remains low, and is expected to continue so throughout the season.

Manchester, November 13.—Shipping yarns are very quiet, and for all descriptions of them, to make sales, lower prices have had to be taken. There have been some very large offers, involving considerable quantities for shipping, but at prices too low for acceptance. Still, in almost every case where offers have been taken, it has been at a reduced price, even on the decline of last week. Home trade yarns have also been very flat, and prices are still tending in favor of buyers. In the cloth market this may be registered as one of the worst days we have had this year. Notwithstanding the extensive adoption of short time to restrict production, both in spinning and weaving, sellers have been obliged to consent to considerable reductions in price. The feeling almost amounts to panic, and people compelled to sell have accepted very low rates. There is a very uneasy and anxious feeling in the market, and there seems to be a want of confidence both among sellers and buyers. Buyers who had large offers in the market at a decline on then current rates, have now withdrawn, and are again disposed cautiously to wait and see the turn of events. Messrs, John Slagg & Co. report of to-day's cloth market:

"During the whole of the past week prices have been slowly giving way, and buyers appear determined to keep out of the market. There is consequently a strong pressure to realize on the part of manufacturers, but very unremunerative offers are made, and on the whole the market closes in a more gloomy state than we have experienced for a considerable time."
