THANKSOIVING DAY .- To-day having been appointed as a day of thanksgiving and prayer, both by the President of the United States and the City Fathers, no paper will be issued from this office until Saturday morning. It has been always customary, heretofore, for the city to celebrate its own thanksgiving day separate from that of the Union or of the State, but we suppose our wise men considered that we were too poor at present to spare two days from work, and that, therefore, it was best to lump the business. The principal food for reflection on thanksgiving day, in a national point of view, will be, that, bad as things are, they might have been a great deal worse; but, municipally speaking, our causes for gratitude are much more positive. The city has been spared the visitation of any fatal epidemic at a time when we had every reason to expect and dread such a catastrophe, and we are gradually-and, in some respects, rapidly—regaining a prosperous and peaceful condition. When another year rolls round we hope that the merging of the national and the city thanksgiving days into one may be more appropriate.

NOVEMBER 29-THE FIRST NEWSPAPER PRINTED BY STEAM .- Doubtless but few of our readers are aware that printing newspapers by steam was first accomplished so recently as November 29, 1814. The edition of the London Times of that date was the first ever printed by a steam press. The handpress could seldom strike off more than 300 impressions an hour, and it was a tedious and laborious job to get off the 4000 copies of which the daily issue of the Times at that period consisted. It was the second Mr. JOHN WALTE', son of the first and father of the present proprietor of the Times. who made this innovation on the old routine of the office. He took charge of the paper in 1803, and the very next year he employed one THOMAT MART-ZEB to construct an automatic press, but for various reasons the scheme at that time went through, and it was not until 1814 that Konio, a Saxon, succeeded in perfecting a steam press that was used to print the Times for November 29. was not allowed to try his experiment in the Times office, but the form was taken to another building, and an unusually large edition successfully printed. The pressmen had threatened destruction to the inventor and his machine, because they believed it would throw them out of employment. As a ruse to keep them from suspecting that any thing unusual was going on, they were told to wait for expected news from the continent. It was about six o'clock in the morning when Mr. Walter went into the press room and astonished its occupants by telling them that the Times was already printed by steam; that if they attempted violence there was a force ready to suppress it; but that if they were peaceable their wages should be continued to every one of them until similar employment could be found for them. The promise was, doubtless faithfully performed, and having so said he distributed several copies among them. The Times next morning, of course, had an editorial crowing over the result of their enter-

editorial crowing over the result of their enterprise, and explaining to their readers the history and principle of the self-acting printing machine. A half century has rolled by since then, and we now have steam presses as far superior to Konio's automaton as that was to the old hand machine : but until we have a complete automatic type-setter, we shall never again have such a sensation in the printing business as was created by the first steam

A white man and a negro, rejoicing in the incendiary name of Guy, were arrested for amusing themselves with mutual instruction in the noble art of self-defence in the portico of the Postoffice. His Honor considered the Postoffice too public a place for such exhibitions, and fined the pugilistic performers \$10 each.

Two fair-complexioned individuals who preferred whiskey to water, pavements to mattresses, and the sky to bed-curtains, and who had selected repectively Cumberland street and Fraser's Wharf for their sleeping apartments, were charged \$5 each for the indulgence of their outre fancies.

Tom, a colored specimen of the genus homo, who had drunk whiskey until he saw stars, and then taken a horizontal position at the corner of Broad and State streets to compare notes between the whickey and heavenly luminaries, where he was incontinently taken in charge by a third species of stars, who kindly furnished him with more private quarters, for which he was required to pay the isual amount of \$5 currency.
