The domand is limited, and, being mostly local, the market continues dull and drooping. Receivers are anxious to realize, and in order to do so are compelled to make a general reduction in prices from day to day, there being very little competition among buyers. Prices for Sugar are about &c lower than they were yesterday, and those for Molasses fully 3255 3 gallon. 
